

It's Time For Double Decker Arts Festival 2013 Put on Your Dancin' Shoes, Y'all!

Double Decker 2013 promises to be a weekend starring tons of delicious local cuisine and an exciting musical line-up. The festival attracts an estimated 55,000 attendees a year, and with so many reasons to head to town, that number isn't surprising.

I spoke to Mary-Katheryn M. Herrington, Director of Tourism and Marketing at Oxford Convention and Visitors Bureau. She's been working with Double Decker for nine years. "It's kind of constantly evolving. I'm really excited about our partnership with Thacker Mountain Radio on Friday night. I think it will be a great opportunity to celebrate music and art in Oxford on Friday evening when there are so many people out and about. I'm also excited about our partnership with the

Yoknapatwpha Arts Council, and the studio tours they will be doing. Our goal at the tourism council is to bring people to town, and we are focused on how to showcase the best of what Oxford has to offer."

The music starts Friday night at 6 pm with a special Thacker Mountain Radio Show on the Square, featuring the Eric Deaton Trio and the final Oxford performance by Blue Mountain. Double Decker Saturday boasts a full day of events beginning at 10 am with the University of Mississippi Steel Drum Orchestra and ending with the Drive By Truckers, who will take the stage at 8:30 pm.

Booths located on and around the Square will offer all kinds of art by local artists, including wire jewelry, hand carved wood pieces, stained glass, and pottery. The Yoknapatawpha Arts Council will be hosting several events coinciding with the Double Decker festivities on the Courthouse Lawn Friday and Saturday, including studio tours on the Double Decker bus stopping at the studios of artists Ron Dale, Jere Allen, Jason Bolden, and Paula Temple. YAC will also host painting classes and pottery demonstrations. Shuttles run every 15 minutes from the Oxford Conference Center to the Square 10 am to 11 pm on Saturday, \$5 a person and free for children 13 and under.



Drive-By Truckers to Headline Double Decker

Boasting a mix of Southern pride and erudite lyrics, Drive-By Truckers became one of the most well-respected alternative country-rock bands of the 2000s. The band is led by frontman Patterson Hood and features a rotating cast of Georgia and Alabama natives. History, folklore, politics, and character studies all share equal space in the band's catalog. After being on tour for some time, the band released

The Big To-Do and Go-Go Boots, both of which were released by ATO Records.

Meanwhile, New West Records combed through the band's first decade of material to help compile Ugly Buildings, Whores, and Politicians: Greatest Hits 1998-2009, which marked the band's final release for the record label in August 2011.

Lee Fields & The Expressions Live at Double Decker

Since the late sixties, Lee Fields has amassed a prolific catalog of albums and has toured and played with such legends as Kool & The Gang and Little Royal. With a career spanning 43 years, releases on twelve different record labels, and having toured the world over with his raucous-yettender voice, it's mind-blowing that the music he's

making today is the best of his career. Today, with **The Expressions**, Lee Fields continues to evolve.

"In a curious case of musical evolution, the older Fields becomes, the closer he gets to perfecting the sound of soul that he grew up with as a young man," said music writer, scholar, and DJ Oliver Wang about Fields in a piece for NPR in July 2009.

Renowned throughout the global Funk community, Lee Fields has poured his grunts and screams over a legacy of funk and soul hits from the early seventies, including such 45 RPM classics as "She's a Lovemaker," "The Bull Is Coming," and "The Funky Screw," not to mention his well-sought-after Let's Talk It Over LP, which draws four digit bids from collectors worldwide.

When Truth & Soul started as a record label in

record a sweet soul record that would be modeled after the near perfect formula which bands like The Moments, The Delfonics, and The Stylistics had created. The owners called in singer Lee Fields and

recorded the single "Do You Love Me (Like You Say You Do)." What happened in the studio was pure magic and thus, The Expressions were born. Fast forward almost two years and The Expressions featuring Lee Fields have successfully created a unique and personal sound that can hold court with the bands they set out to emulate. However, the music has devel-

oped into a deeply soulful mix of old and new. The formula stayed the same but the style has been adapted for the ears of people who didn't grow up on Al Green or Sam Cooke. Elements of modern music have crept their way into the mix to create something entirely fresh and unique. The Expressions have surely lived up to the name, each song they make is choked full of raw emotion that permeates deep through your ear hole straight to the soul.



The Spring Football Tease

Oxford, Miss. (TLV) - Twenty-eight thousand rowdy Rebels filled Lee Ann Vaught-Hemmingway Stadium on April 13th to get one last Herring tease of Ole Miss Football. The withdrawals have begun, especially with the promise the Rebels have going into the 2013 season—still over a hundred days away.



The culmination of Spring practice took on an unexpected form at the 2013 Bancorp South Grove Bowl. With countless injuries, the Rebel Nation saw an "extended practice version" for the conclusion of spring practice. The Grove Bowl featured three individual offense vs. defense scrimmages separated by various periods of practice drills. In case you were indulging in other things last weekend, here is a recap.

Offensive Highlights

Senior WR Ja-Mes Logan piloted the offense with five receptions for 101 yards. QB Mikhail Miller was 7–11 for 46 yards passing and added 60 yards to the ground. Sophomore Cody Core accounted for two passes, including one touchdown. Senior transfer QB Khalid Purnell saw minimal action but was able to add a touchdown.

Coach Hugh Freeze said of the offensive standout, "Ja-Mes probably had the best spring of anybody. He was solid every single day, and he made some nice plays today."



Defensive Highlights

Junior LB Serderius Bryant made several standout plays including one interception and 1.5 sacks. Denzel Nkemdiche led the D with 10 tackles.

"Serderius stood out with some explosive plays on the defensive side of the ball," Freeze said. "We had one chance defensively to make a couple of picks, but we didn't. W has to make those. It's a hard balance. That's why we divided them up in the end and let them play it out."

After he redshirted last season, kicker Andrew Ritter was back on the field for the Rebs.

Coach Freeze on Ritter: "He looked really good in the first period. When we went live, we were very consistent from 30 yards in, but when we got outside of that he hit both of them pretty good, just missed. Andy Pappanastos made a long one. But we're still inconsistent there."

The Diamond Rebs will be on the road to Rocky Top this weekend for a three game series vs. Tennessee coming off an impressive home sweep versus the Rammer Jammers from Bama at Swayze this past weekend, even going into extra innings in game three.

In a sport like baseball with so many games

and series, it's always a roller coaster to predict just where we might end up come tourney time. There are roughly 15 SEC games left for the Rebels—currently ranked #17—before they head to Hoover in hopes of making it to Omaha for the big show.

This season, Rebel Athletics has managed to surprise even the most faithful by making it to the post

season despite the topsy turvy moments that have seemed to count them out.

So what can change the momentum of a game? Naturally, the coaches and players do, but another "it" factor is the crowd - especially here in Oxford, it can make all the difference. With roughly seven home games left the Rebels need all the support they can get.

From behind the scenes, I have observed that

players feed off their crowd more than fans might htink. This drives a team like the Diamond Rebels, and has made the difference for them to get fired up early and get the ball rolling sooner.

It has been a major battle for the Diamond Rebs to cook up their offense early in the game and maintain it without getting restless. More

than a time or two, Ole Miss' pitchers have been a saving grace.

What this balancing act makes clear is that momentum could be just what the Rebels need. The motivation from an outside source - an enthusiastic crowd - will keep them pressing forward. If the Rebels can use that momentum in their favor, these next games will

see a team pumped up on that intensity, and they will be extremely hard to beat.

The Rebels return to Swayze Field on Friday, April 25th for a three-game series against the Kentucky Wildcats. While most of Oxford will be Double Deckering, why not make this a double play kind of weekend and come out to support the Diamond Rebs? Let's get Rowdy with the Hotty Toddy!

Giddy-Up: The Oak Ridge Boys to Play Ford Center

When the decorated country gospel vocal group The Oak Ridge Boys takes the stage for a mid-afternoon matinee performance at The Ford Center on Sunday April 28th, it'll be a show seven decades in the making. Sure, they are best known for their smash hit "Elvira" but the group actually has roots that dig way back to the 1940s. Then called the "Oak Ridge Quartet" a version of the group appeared at the Grand Ole Opry as early as 1945.

With several lineup changes, they were strictly a gospel group for the next thirty years, with more than 30 members coming through their ranks. But when a Nashville agent convinced them that singing country songs would be their ticket to stardom, they burst into mainstream consciousness with a string of hits and in the late 70s became a household name. They backed up Paul Simon on "Slip Slidin' Away." They recorded with Ray Charles and George Jones. Their first country album, Y'all Come Back Saloon, was released in 1978 and spawned a string of hits that didn't stop for more than a decade.

Though they had those numerous lineup changes early on—the current lineup of **Duane** Allen (baritone), Joe Bonsall (tenor), William Lee Golden (baritone) and Richard Sterban (bass) has been intact since 1973 and it is this version of the "Oak Ridge Boys" that is now currently celebrating its 40th anniversary.

"It is important to note that even though this is our 40th anniversary tour, it is by no means a farewell tour," says Sterban. "We are still a hard working band and plan to continue to do just that. After all these years we still love doing what we do. We look forward to getting up on stage every night, making our music live for our fans and our audience."

Sterben is the one responsible for what is singlehandedly the most recognizable line in the group's repertoire—the deep resonating bass voice that bellows the line "Oom Poppa Oom Poppa Mow Mow" and the response, "Yeah!" on the '81 hit "Elvira."

Since that hit, the Oaks have continued to straddle the line between gospel and pop country music. They signed with Sugar Hill Records in 2001 and for many subsequent years focused again on gospel songs, releasing new collections and compilations.

But they turned back to Nashville and a new, younger audience, a few years ago, when by Tom Speed

Shooter Jennings enlisted them to work on his album The Wolf in 2007 and introduced them to producer Dave Cobb.

In 2009, they recorded their first secular album in nearly a decade with The Boys Are Back, co-produced by Cobb and Allen. The collection included cover versions of songs by Neil Young, Ray LaMontagne, and John Lee **Hooker**. It also helped them reached a new audience with their version of The White Stripes' "Seven Nation Army," featuring their four-part harmonies roaring the cascading riff that has become omnipresent at sporting events.

"That's as good of an example as you'll ever hear of us reinventing ourselves," says Sterban. "Cobb said 'you guys are a vocal group and we want to do this song differently than it's ever been done before.' So we ended up doing a lot of the instrumental parts of the song vocally. So it's still 'Seven Nation Army,' but there's no mistaking that it's the Oak Ridge Boys. We stayed true to our sound. We've reinvented ourselves but have not changed ourselves. "

The group may seem like a throwback to some, but The Boys Are Back reached a new audience, and the touring has never ceased. These days the group plays roughly 150 dates a year, including some at the Oak Ridge Boys Theater in Branson, Mo. but others at concert halls, theaters, festivals, county fairs, and other outlets.

"We don't sit around waiting for the grass to grow under our feet," says Sterban. "We keep busy. Another important factor of our longevity is we love the creative process of actually going into the recording studio and creating new music. We're getting ready to do that again. New music puts new life and new energy into us and into the show."

Part of the reasoning for a mid-day show is to attract a wide array of concertgoers to what is unabashedly a family-friendly show. "We have tried to always select material that has a positive

message and uplifting nature," says Sterban. "We try to shy away from songs that have negative lyrics. Over the years if you listen to country music you hear a lot of drinking songs and cheating songs and we try to shy away from lyrics like that and I think that has served us well. An Oak Ridge show is a family show. Our music is always uplifting in nature." w

The Ground and The Fury

Dinners on the grounds were once such a mainstay for rural churches in the South that many had rafts of rickety tables attached together under and often onto trees between the chapel and the cemetery. There the words of remonstrance and the hymns of loss faded, and the food itself became a source of redemption and reward.

Though ostensibly polite pastoral get-togethers, Southern dinners on the grounds were more often stages for social clambering of the pettiest and most vicious sort. Despite the communal reason for the food, there was always an underlying competitive element to the affair. Food Network competitions pale in comparison to those rural stages of venomous culinary put-downs; knocking a recent wok wonder off prime time seems trivial when you're dealing with decades of spite. Every square foot of splintered table space was contested and every element of a good "spread" subjected to offstage critique. Transgressors were damned for such cardinal sins as using Jell-O pudding mix instead of homemade custard, and if you brought fried chicken in that red-and-white cardboard bucket, you would not get any sympathy when your high heels got stuck in an ant bed.

The queens of these community catfights took inordinate pride in lording over the lesser. My distant Cousin Dora's angel food cake was a marvel to see. She displayed it on her grandmother's

cut-glass (not crystal; her crystal did not travel) cake stand beside a bowl of macerated strawberries and sweetened cream that she had her husband Harvey whip on site after he had driven 50 miles wearing a tie the whole way. The cake, flanked by a vase with a fistful of her show-quality roses and fortified by something along the lines of a fudge divinity she just "threw together at the last minute," was displayed on a creaseless, delicately-patterned white cloth. Dora sliced it with a wooden-handled sponge cake cutter and served it on Classic White Chinet. Everyone hated

her airs, but took malicious comfort in knowing that Harvey had been slipping around with the choir director for at least fifteen years. Rumor had it that her sister-in-law, tired of her high-andmightiness, snuck into her house one day while the cake was in the oven and slammed the door so it would fall. That, they said with a knowing look, was the year Dora broke a toe before the church homecoming.

Adversity is a dynamic portal for new ideas, especially when it comes to recipes, and if it were a big occasion, the range of variations in a single dish was astounding. Staples such as fried chicken, baked beans, and potato salad always proliferated, and those cooks who specialized in these dishes had their adherents and detractors, usually in equal numbers. 
dipped or battered fried chicken and those who liked a much lighter crust. The dividing line with baked beans involved the use of brown sugar or molasses and with potato salad, creamed or chunky.

often attended these gatherings with my grandmother Monette. Not a cook herself (history and genealogy were her interests: according to her I was related to everyone between New Albany and Granada), Monette stayed out of the fray, but she was a discriminating eater who from past experience knew the tables well. "Be sure

and get one of Alice Edmond's fried pies," she'd say, or, "Jane Early has that 8-layer caramel cake recipe from her mother Eugenia, a Hardin, my first cousin Dudley's second cousin on his mother's side, before she married Jane's father, who gambled away the family farm in a lop-sided mule race. He had a glass eye that he used to take out and put in his iced tea when their preacher came over."

Nowadays, store-bought collapsible tables have replaced the long lines of sagging and splintered pine boards beneath the blackjack oaks and sweet gums, but anyone who brings Stouffer's to a church social in Mississippi is still going to get talked about.

And not in a good way.







Ode to Proud Larrys': 20 Years of Making Memories

Proud Larrys' opened their doors 20 years ago in one of those places that seem cursed. The space at 211 South Lamar had changed hands often. The restaurants, bars, and retail shops that occupied the space there never seemed to find their footing or their clientele.

Most recently, it had been a daiquiri shop. But the three would-be bar owners, fresh out of college and drunk on idealism and ambition, didn't care. They had a simple plan to serve pizza by the slice, pour good beer, and attract good musicians to perform there.

Since then, as a music club, Proud Larry's has undoubtedly helped to make Oxford a measurably cooler place to live. It has done so by helping to nurture the local music scene while at the same time attracting national touring acts to Oxford to make it the premier tour stop in the state. The proof is on the wall. Even though it hasn't been updated in years, the glossy black and white promo photos (even now a relic unto themselves in the digital age) present an impressive who's who of talent.

Since the beginning, Larrys' embraced a wide variety of music but also always had a

strong tilt towards the jam band scene. Bands that would soon be filling largtheaters and amphitheaters have taken the small stage tucked into a front corner of the room. Bands like String Cheese Incident, Leftover Salmon, Medeski, Martin & Wood,

and Galactic played there early before outgrowing the confines. Local bluesmen found a home there too, though. Junior Kimbrough, R.L. Burnside, and Kenny **Brown** shows were frequent from the beginning. The North Mississippi Allstars basically cut their teeth on that stage.

Prior to Larrys' the music scene in Oxford

good local bands, some touring acts. Big concerts took place on the Ole Miss campus. But Proud Larrys' worked to cultivate local musicians and fuel their aspirations. Soon it wasn't just a few good bands. There was a scene. Musicians reassembling in dif-

> ferent configurations to form new bands, expand their boundaries, and find new inspiration.


And soon, ambitious booking brought new artists to town, and one of the great things Larrys' did early on and a tradition that continues today, is to have a few selected concerts that eschew

the raucous bar atmosphere by placing chairs on the dance floor for a hushed, seated concert. This environment has yielded some of the most memorable performances at the venue. Whether it was Mose Allison in one of his many appearances, Jimmie Dale Gilmore, Peter Rowan, or Michael Hedges, the venue has provided an outlet for experiences that are both raucous and reverential. For that, it has earned a reputation as a music venue that is legendary in its own right. When Elvis Costello and Modest Mouse were in town recording and wanted to try out their new material for a live audience, they chose Proud Larrys'.

Proud Larrys' is now often cited in national publications as being one of the best college bars, the best music venues, and so on. The accolades are only limited by the number of magazine writers who have been exposed to the club.

Proud Larrys' has become an integral part of the cultural fabric of the town—an institution as important to the town's character as Square Books and The Hoka. On the best nights, Proud Larrys' feels like a communal living room and the stage there is the fireplace where family and friends gather together to share memories and make new ones. So far, 20 years worth of them. Here's to 20 more.

Whose Festival Is It, Anyway? by Shelby Hooker Rayburn

Recent changes in food vending policy heat up tempers and highlight differences in our community.

OXFORD, MISS. (TLV) – For the last 18 years, The Double Decker Arts Festival has been one of Oxford's biggest and most anticipated events of the Spring. Inevitably, any festival of this magnitude will have its share of problems and face criticism. This year has proved to be no different—the grumbling started earlier than usual.

The most conspicuous change in policy was an updated set of guidelines put forth by the "Food Vendor Committee," a panel of five Oxonians picked by the Tourism Council to vet applications in order "to improve the selection process, revamp the food vendor guidelines, and help make Double Decker a food-lover's festival," as stated in a letter sent to applicants.

Double Decker now requires the use of at least one "local" or unique ingredient in a unique dish for all food vendors. Basically, in order to even be considered for one of the 25 booths that will be surrounding the courthouse next Saturday, they can't serve something that's already on their menu. Several local restaurant owners aren't happy about the new rules and some are angry enough that they aren't participating.

"It's called Square Pizza," says pizzeria owner and Kudzu Kings front man Tate Moore. "I don't know if they know what goes in pizza or not, but, it's flour, water, and yeast. I make my own sauce, grind my own cheese, and when the weather's good I grow my own cherry tomatoes and my own basil."

Moore was surprised, to say the least, when his application for a vending permit was returned. "When they said they want something more local, I took offense." He said that he received an email from the committee "suggesting" ways in which he could alter his menu and reapply for a permit. "They made suggestions to maybe put some spinach on my pizzato make a pimento cheese calzone... to maybe get some Mississippi Gulf shrimp. That's [expletive] [expletive]."

He added that until there's new leadership in the Tourism Council, he "will have nothing more to do with the city." He then said that the Kudzu Kings may not be involved with Double Decker again, referring to the band's performance at the inaugural festival in 1995.

Two Stick Sushi owner Allison Borders-**Henson** was also among the applicants who were initially rejected.

"The first letter they sent out asked something like does your dish have a tale about Mississippi or use an old family recipe," she said. "Well, [Two Stick Chef] Phat Tran came here from Vietnam in 1972 and has been cooking in Oxford since the minute he got into town; first for Paul Chen at Ruby Chinese and now for me and Chad at Two Stick. So, those egg rolls, wontons, and soups that we serve—Phat has been making those in Oxford for more than 40 years. And those are Paul's family recipes. Older people, when they come back to visit Oxford come into Two Stick specifically for those

She said that after changing her menu and resubmitting her application she was accepted.

Buck Walden of The Rib Cage says that Double Decker is a publicly funded event. "I pay my 2% tourism tax just like everyone else," he stated, adding that this will be the first time in eight years that he will not have a booth at the festival.

"It's kind of crazy for them to call it 'A Taste of Oxford' when they're not letting it be a taste of Oxford," Walden explained. "If they want it to be 'A Southern Foodways Alliance Taste of Mississippi' or 'Big Bad Double Decker' then they ought to call it that and pay for it with their own money."

Walden's suggestions refer to James Beard Foundation award winners and two prominent committee members: City Grocery Restaurant Group Chef John Currence and Southern Foodways Alliance Director and writer John T.

"The Tourism Council asked John T. and me for our input about what they could do to increase the quality of the experience at Double Decker and to make it something that was more representative of how special of a place Oxford is," Currence explained.

"As regular travelers around the country as food tourists and professionals, we spend a lot of time in this particular arena, and both of us said the same thing: because there were no criteria around what the folks could bring, the offerings were entirely lackluster."

Currence also blamed a lack of volunteer effort from the community, which, he said "resulted in the festival languishing in mediocrity."

Currence went on to say, "It's gotten to the point that there's absolutely nothing special about the

food offerings that folks were bringing to the table. There's nothing unique about it. There's nothing that set Double Decker apart from any other festival other than the fact that it was set on the Square in

That was our opinion, they solicited it, and they took it, and then came back to us and asked if we would be willing to be part of a committee that would help the Festival get back to what it was when it first started and try to take it a step up."

Currence said that he and Edge created a set of new criteria that encouraged vending applicants to create unique foods that represent the culture of Oxford and that tell a compelling story.

Moore disagreed with the new criteria, saying "I think if somebody wants a funnel cake, then they should be able to get a funnel cake. And I don't care where it's from."

Walden said the letter's criteria "was saying 'Mississippi this and local that,' and my thought was that bar-b-que is pretty Mississippi." He added that Double Decker is a day that all the local restaurants need and thinks that the committee "would know that adding another hoop for us to jump through just doesn't really make sense."

Currence explained that some restaurant owners may have misunderstood the new rules, saying that he thought that language used in the letter was "a little too high-minded for people."

"As a result, of the 31 applications that came in, there were only seven or eight that met the criteria," Currence said, while also admitting that **Bouré**, one of his own restaurants, was included in the returned applications.

Oxford Farmer's Market owner Liz Coppola was also a member of the committee charged with vetting the applications. "Some people made a real effort to try to do this," she commented, going on to say that others seemed "quite dismissive of the whole thing," which caused the committee to assume that those applicants "didn't even try."

As far as the emails explaining the reasons for rejection, Currence maintained that "all it said was 'please rethink this.' [The language] should have probably been a little more warm and fuzzy...of creating something unique that you're not necessarily able to walk in your restaurant and get every day." He admitted that a more affable approach may have smoothed some ruffled feathers.

"The long and short of this is that we really weren't asking that much of folks," Currence asserted. "It's interesting to me that Tate has wasted so much energy spouting off like a 12-year-old on Facebook when all he had to do was make a call to Woodson Ridge Farms and say 'Hey, can I get some spinach to put on my pizza?""

He then commented, "Instead of doing that he just riots around like a little girl on the internet crying about it."

Moore says that he didn't understand why the city was trying to make it more difficult for him to do business, claiming that due to last year's construction project, he "almost went out of business because they shut down Van Buren for three months...And then for the powers that be tell me that I can't be involved in the biggest festival of the spring? What are they trying to do? I'm still recovering. It's a huge financial loss, but, then again, they've raised the prices of the booths. So, I'm just going to open my doors as normal and give away I ate at Square Pizza on Double Decker 2013' bumper stickers to everyone who comes in to eat."

He then declared, "I challenge John Currence and John T. Edge to make a better slice of pizza than me any day of the week, and I won't change my recipe a [expletive] bit. I can kick their ass right now."

Currence acknowledged that he is fully in favor of having an open discussion with people going forward, but pointed out that "no one has a right to participate in Double Decker, it's an application process. It's a privilege. If we're going to create something that we can be proud of ...it's going to require some folks to step outside of their regular comfort zone and try a little bit harder to do something to represent Oxford. And they should be proud of that rather than angry."

He also claimed that the financial benefits of doing concessions for one day on the Square ends up, at just about very best, a break-even experience. "It's not, by any means," he contended, "the windfall that anybody wants to paint it as."

But, the Food Vendor committee isn't doing anything to the local restaurants that the artist selection juries haven't been doing to local artists for years.

Local artist Anne Scott Barrett mostly sells her designs on t-shirts because she wants to keep them affordable and they are easier to sell. "Everyone buys t-shirts because everyone wears t-shirts," she explained. She has a well-known "Mississippi Crooked Letter" illustration that she believes could be a big seller at Double Decker if she were allowed to sell them. She went on to elaborate that "they

don't allow anyone to sell t-shirts" during the Festival except the official Double Decker t-shirt commissioned by the Tourism Council.

"It kind of hurts my feelings when I live here, work here, and pay taxes here; but I get shut out just because this is the medium that I use." Barrett confessed.

Deirdre Uncapher, a stained glass sculptor who moved to Oxford (via a brief stop in Water Valley) from Maine ten years ago, will be set up next Saturday for her seventh straight year. She explained that all artists must submit digital photographs of their work with their permit applications. While she freely admits that there really isn't any other feasible way of submitting a sample, she says it can be frustrating as a sculptor of glass because light is so vital for her pieces and photography is an art unto itself.

But, she says that the awards presented to the best pieces in each category are "all judged by photographs before Saturday." The winning pieces are placed on display during the Festival at the Powerhouse and remain there for a month, which means that the winning pieces will not be on display at their respective artists' booths. "But," Uncapher says, "it's a good sales tactic to have your ribbon and your item in your booth. I really wish the judges would walk the grounds to pick the win-

Yet it is the musicians and technicians who have by far the hardest application process: there simply isn't one. Dave Sage, owner of Rebel Sound and **Lighting** in Oxford said that he doesn't even get an opportunity to enter a bid to handle the stage production for the Festival. He doesn't think it is fair because "If I was too expensive, I could understand. But the Tourism Council, from what I've been told, insisted on hiring sound, lighting, and staging from a company based in Chicago."

Sage pointed out that he has only been allowed to participate in Double Decker once in the Festival's eighteen year history. "The only reason I got it that year was because I complained to just about every member of the Board of Aldermen, and even then it was the smaller stage." He added that the price he was paid for several acts throughout the day was substantially lower than he normally receives for one three-hour concert.

The music booking is also being outsourced to another state. "I don't understand why the city chooses to hire a guy in Memphis to book our festival for us," Sage mused.

"They say 'local, local, local' and then they spend



\$30,000-\$50,000 on non-local sound, non-local lights, and non-local music acts," Moore argued. "The hypocrisy has no end."

Barrett doesn't agree with the decision to outsource the Festival's biggest draw, either. "Memphis is making more money off this than we are," she suspects, adding that it all could be, and originally was done by Oxonians.

"In my mind," she recalled, "Double Decker started out as being a reflection of all us. There was a little book of poems about Oxford called Ox Tales that I illustrated and we just got to march around the Square and act silly."

"But," according to her, "now Double Decker is a good representation of what's going on in Oxford, which is 'look good but not be good.' Like Robert Earl Reed said, 'Oxford has become a caricature of itself." She continued, "It's too many people looking down their noses at people just trying to make a living, trying to hock their wares, trying to sell their music, trying to be heard. It's infuriating."

Moreover, I was approached by several local musicians who would only agree to speak on the condition of anonymity. When I asked many of them why the discretion, a common answer was along the lines of "I really want to play Double Decker and I don't want to say something critical on the record and get black listed."

The fact that so many share that sentiment speaks volumes about the massive rift between the people who plan the festival and the people who make the festival. We, as a community, need to find some common ground and come together to return Double Decker to the event that not only we can all be proud of, but also one that we can all participate in and enjoy. Like most dysfunctional relationships, we legitimately need to work on our communication. Ty

Tax Changes for 2013

Now that the 2012 tax season has wrapped up, it's time to take a look at the changes that have been made to income taxes for 2013.

- •401(k): Individuals now can contribute up to \$17,500.
- •Increased deduction for Social Security: For two years, taxpayers got a small reprieve when the deduction went from 6.2% down to 4.2% in a temporary tax cut. Now that additional 2% is back. Before too much more time goes by in 2013, be certain your calculations and deductions are correct. If you had a child leave home and he or she is no longer a dependent, your overall figures will change. If you have multiple jobs, are getting married or divorced, buying a house, having a baby, or usually have a balance due or get a large refund, your tax situation will change and you might need to fill out a revised W-4 with your employer.
- •If you're in a high-income bracket (\$400,000 single or \$450,000 married filing jointly), your taxes are going up from 35% to 39.6%.
- •Mileage rates have changed: Use of a car for business is now 56.5 cents per mile, medical miles are now 24 cents per mile and driving for charitable organizations stays the same at 14 cents per mile.
- Section 179: For assets acquired in 2013, the deduction is up to \$500,000.
- Home-office deduction: If you're self-employed, the home-office deduction changes for 2013 will impact you. In the past, taxpayers have had one choice in claiming the deduction: Do multiple calculations involving mortgage interest, utilities, property taxes paid, square feet of space used, insurance, and so on. Now, beginning in 2013 and reportable in 2014, there is a simplified version. All that will be required now is to multiply the square footage used for business times \$5 per square foot, up to a maximum of 300 square feet. That space must still be used strictly for business—regular and exclusive use, and as your principal place of business. The total of Schedule A home-related deductions will go on the Schedule A and not be divided with the home office deduction. Additionally, there won't be any depreciation or recapture when you sell your home down the road.

Consult the IRS website (www.irs.gov) for Home Office Deduction and navigate to the section about the changes for 2013. Make any necessary adjustments now so you don't get caught short next April.



The selected script may be considered as written but the festival producers may work with the writer on changing some aspects of the script as needed. The



ANSWERS:



Q: Hi, first-time painter here. My dad offered some advice to my roommate and I on painting our apartment, such as putting down dropcloths and stirring the paint really well. Is there any other key information we need so we do a good job? The landlord won't be happy if we mess it up! —Keri C., Meridian

A: Preparation is the biggest part of painting. It can be maddening getting everything ready to paint, but if you do it right, putting down each coat is really satisfying. You'll doubtless hear much more advice from friends and relatives on how to do the best job, but here are some key points:

- Get clearance from the landlord or building management before painting. Just as importantly, pay attention to and follow any specific instructions, such as which colors to use.
- Prepare the room(s): Remove as much furniture and stuff as possible. Move what remains to the center of the room and cover with dropcloths or old sheets. Cover the floor or carpets with overlapping dropcloths.
- Prepare the walls: Take down pictures and carefully remove nails and screws; fill the small holes with spackling compound and let dry for 24 hours before sanding smooth.
- Remove cover plates from wall switches and outlets; cover window and door hardware with plastic or remove the hardware (if it's easy to put back on). Cover light fixtures with plastic shopping bags and secure with masking tape.
- •Brush away loose plaster, cobwebs, dirt and peeling paint. Sand bumpy areas smooth using fine-grit sandpaper. Wash the walls with



a sponge dampened in a light soap-and-water mix or wall-cleaning product, and let dry.


- Use blue painter's tape (which is less sticky than masking tape) to mask off window and door trim, and other areas where you don't want paint to go.
- Assemble all the stuff you need to paint: Not just an assortment of brushes and rollers, but paint trays, stirring sticks (usually available free with paint purchase) and old rags or towels for cleanup.
- Save money not by picking the cheapest paint, but by purchasing the exact amount you need. How to do that? Measure the square footage of each wall (length times height) and total the numbers.
- •Use primer if you don't know what type of paint is currently on the walls, or if you're covering glossy paint with matte paint or vice versa, or if the old paint is darker than the new paint. Once prepped, you're ready to paint! Follow some tried-and-true methods for laying down paint: Start high and work on one wall at a time. Use a foam edger or a brush to paint a border about 3 inches wide where the wall meets the ceiling. Then start rolling on paint, using a "W" pattern in various directions until the wall is covered. Once the walls are done, paint the trim, windows and finally the doors, if you're painting them.

HOME TIP: To prevent tracking paint out of an area, wear a pair of old shoes while painting; step out of them and into clean shoes at the edge of the paint area when leaving.

Moments in time

THE HISTORY CHANNEL

- On May 1, 1926, Ford Motor Company becomes one of the first companies in America to adopt a five-day, 40-hour week.
 In early 1914, Ford had announced it would pay workers a minimum wage of \$5 per eight-hour day, upped from a previous rate of \$2.34 for nine hours.
- On April 30, 1939, the New York World's
 Fair opens in New York City on a 1,200-acre
 site at Flushing Meadow Park in Queens.
 Among the new technology exhibited was
 FM radio, robotics, fluorescent lighting and a
 crude fax machine.
- On May 3, 1946, in Tokyo, the International Military Tribunals begins hearing the case against 28 Japanese military and government officials accused of committing war crimes during World War II. The trial ended with 25 of 28 Japanese defendants being found guilty. Of the three other defendants, two had died during the trial, and one was declared insane.
- On May 5, 1955, the Federal Republic of Germany (West Germany) becomes a sovereign state when the United States, France and Great Britain end their military occupation, which had begun in 1945. With this action, West Germany was given the right to rearm and become a full-fledged member of the western alliance against the Soviet Union.
- On May 2, 1964, an explosion of a charge assumed to have been placed by Viet Cong terrorists sinks the USNS Card at its dock in Saigon. No one was injured and the ship was eventually raised and repaired. The Card had arrived in Saigon two days earlier.
- On May 4, 1970, at Kent State University in Ohio, students protesting the Vietnam War torch the ROTC building on campus, and Ohio Gov. James Rhodes called in the National Guard to restore order. The Guardsmen fired into the crowd, killing four and wounding 11. They were later brought to trial for the shootings, but found not guilty.
- On April 29, 1986, in a game against the Seattle Mariners at Fenway Park, Roger Clemens of the Boston Red Sox becomes the first pitcher in Major League Baseball to strike out 20 batters in a nine-inning game. Ten years later, Clemens repeated the feat.

Kopecky Family Band LIVE at Double Decker 4/27

Sometimes song is thicker than blood.

First drawn together amid a college dorm 'pass the guitar' session in 2007, Kopecky Family Band co-founders Kelsey Kopecky and Gabe Simon quickly realized that they shared something beyond their alma mater.

"Gabe started playing and I was totally blown away," Kopecky remembers, "by his melodies, his talent. Something in the way he played felt so familiar to me and moving. I asked him if he wanted to get together and play some, sing some. And a few days later we did that. And it was crazy, it came together immediately—it just fit."

"I had just met her," remembers Simon,

"but when we sang together, it sounds corny, but it felt like we'd known each other forever. Old souls meeting again. We were finishing each other's lyrics, just immediately connected in the music."

This synergy propelled the duo forward and within months

they had wrangled the rest of their sonic siblings – **Steven Holmes** on lead guitar, **David Krohn** on drums, **Markus Midkiff** on cello, and **Corey Oxendine** on bass – making them six in total. Within the year the burgeoning Family had released an EP, *Embraces*, and embarked on a nearly nonstop touring schedule, garnering fans around the country and developing both their sound... and their ties with one another.

"When we were originally trying to figure out a name," says Simon "we felt that Kelsey's last name had the right ring to it and we added the 'family' because that's really what it feels like when we all play together."

And that is what it sounds like, too.

The Kopecky Family Band are built on a foundation of intimately connected musical tones, warm and welcoming melodies, bright and epic symphonic layering – and vocal harmonies that recall all the greats – Gram and Emmylou, June and Johnny and onward and up...

You can hear the band's hometown of Nashville in this music too, the rich history of place – but past is always brought gently into present. This is not country, not pop, not folk, not rock, but something much more complex – call it a Brave New Nashville. It is a music that contains all the comfort of home while simultaneously embracing a bright, energetic openness – a willing-

ness to explore and expand.

Over the past few years there have been two more EPs from the band – *The Disaster* and *Of Epic Proportions* (both released in 2010) – as well as a split 7" with Seattle's **Ivan & Alyosha** and revelatory performances at the Next Big Nashville and SXSW festivals. 2011 saw the Family on tour with artists including **Devotchka** and **Gomez**, and year-end accolades such as *Paste* naming them one of the "25 Best Live Acts" and "20 Best New Bands" of the year. And after last year's exhaustive co-headlining tour with **The Lumineers**, and performances at Lollapalooza and the Austin City Limits festi-

val, the band finally got off the bus and into the studio, settling down for their first full-length.

The result, Kids Raising Kids, is a collection of tracks that reveal a band fully formed. This is sing-along, clap-your-hands, stomp-your-feet music. But it is also deep

music, rife with emotion and layers of feeling – from melancholy to elation and back again.

"With this new record," explains Kopecky, "we tried really hard to be in our bodies, to be responding to the music not only with our heads and hearts, but in a visceral way too. We wanted it to be honest and emotional and true."

As a result, songs like "The Glow" soar and sweep, while tracks like "Change" keep it quiet and fragile. "She's the One" rides a dark, propulsive beat while "Waves" is shimmering and blindingly bright and "Heartbeat" is playful, sing-along pop. The record is a study of opposites, yet the refreshingly distinctive, unified sound these six musicians make together bleeds through each and every song. The album holds the cohesiveness and the complexity that belie true family bonds.

"We didn't want to be afraid to explore," says Simon, of *Kids Raising Kids*, "we wanted to go deep into different sounds, textures, genres – whatever fit the song and the story we were telling. If there's a thread that runs through this record it's the idea of 'kids raising kids', of each of us in the band really raising each other these last few years, and of everything that comes with that, the frustration and the fun and the good times and the bad times too. You come out the other side and you hope you've helped each other grow."
