This is Only the Beginning: The End of All Music Marks 12 Years of Vinyl Vibes

This year marks the 12th anniversary of the opening of beloved local record store **End of All Music**, located on the northeast corner of

Oxford Courthouse Square, on the second floor of the Duvall's building.

End of All Music opened on March 12, 2012 at its original location, about a mile and a half up the road on North Lamar Boulevard in a small building that had formerly been a Mexican grocery store.

Owner David Swider, along with friends Bruce Watson and Patrick Addison, who both worked at local record label Fat Possum, had been discussing how Oxford needed a record store.

Swider would complain that he had to drive to Mem-

phis to go to record stores, because there were none in town. There had previously been **Hot Dog Records**, which went out of business in 2006.

"There was a pretty good period of no record store in Oxford, so I had the idea, and Bruce had the money," said Swider. "He didn't have the time, but had a little money and some records. And I had the time, but no money. We got together and found a little spot on North Lamar. They were moving, so we got the place."

Swider recalled the basic, metal structure as being "hilariously built" but "super cheap." Also, the building was horribly infested, so they first had to gut it then paint it.

He was the only employee at first. And

while Watson was the owner, Swider was the manager, and every year moving forward he would gradually buy a piece of the company until around 2015, when he finally owned the whole thing.

"So without Bruce there definitely would be no End of All Music," he said. "He was the early brains behind it with me. I really didn't

know what I was doing."

Swider had been working at **Square Books** downtown, and had urged owner **Richard Howorth** to start selling records there, but he wasn't having it. "Richard didn't want to go into the record business, so I figured I would try."

Although the initial location was off the beaten path, Swider described it as "perfect, with low overhead," and that most of their original clientele consisted of "real record heads."

The only way to draw customers was to maintain a good stock, due to lack of foot traffic in that part of town.

"That ended up helping us a lot when we moved, because we were already used to catering to real record people, not just everybody," Swider said. "Which was great."

He said one of the store's historical highlights was in July 2016, when *USA Today* published an article in its travel section, called "Vinyl lives! 10 great record stores for a musical treasure hunt," which included End of All Music, along with seasoned institutions like **Amoeba Music** in Los Angeles, and **Grimey's** in Nashville.

"It kind of blew my mind, and

was just an absolutely crazy thing to see in *USA today*," said Swider.

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New Music Collective Launches with Songwriters Festival March 1–2

Oxford has a reputation as a place for live music, but sometimes good, original live music is hard to find at a decent hour. Luke Fisher and David Anderson, the founders of the Red Clay Music Society, sought an opportunity to merge the touring artist with local musicians.

Over the past year meeting with local musicians, venues, and festival organizers the pair sought to create a format that focused on building a community of musicians and creating opportunities for local musicians to perform.

Red Clay Music Society launches March 1–2, 2024, with two music events. Friday, March 1 features a songwriter's pop-up to announce a partnership with the **Mississippi Songwriters Festival** to host a Hill County edition each year.

The Pop Up Songwriters event will feature Mississippi songwriters performing and sharing stories at Wonderbird Spirits. Tickets to the event are \$10. The event features special guests Alanna Mosely, Ryan Miller, Jeff McCreary, and Grammy-nominated Jimbo Mathus. African Violets

One of the most common houseplants, **African Violets** (saintpaulia species) are members of the gesneriad family and hail from the tropical rainforest region of east Africa near the border of Tanzania and Kenya. The plant readily flowers in the conditions associated with indoor dwellings. There are seven key elements to growing beautiful violets.

First, light conditions: For best growth and flowering, African violets require bright, indirect sunlight-generally within three feet of a southeast- or west-facing window. Lower light levels for longer periods of time are also adequate. The plant's leaves will indicate whether light levels are appropriate. If light is too low, leaves are usually thin, deep green, and appear to reach up for light. The plants may grow, but will flower poorly or not at all. Excessive light causes leaves to be pale or greenish-yellow. Growth slows when light is too high and plants become very compact. Flowering will also begin to decrease. These plants are "photo accumulators," meaning they require a given quantity of light energy before plants will flower. But because they are understory plants, they should never be exposed to full sunlight conditions.

Next, temperature and humidity: African violets prefer temperatures between 60–80°F. During summer months, place plants in the coolest place in the home or in an air-conditioned room. African violets grow best in high humidity, which can be achieved by setting pots in water-tight metal or plastic trays filled with pebbles and water. Do not place pots directly in water as this may cause root rot.

Drainage and soil mixture: Ideal potting mix consists of equal parts of peat moss, vermiculite, and perlite. Soil mixtures should have a pH of about 6.0 to 6.5 (slightly acid) for best results. Pots (clay or plastic) must have drainage holes. Plants in clay pots require more frequent watering than those in plastic pots since evaporation is greater. Be sure to wash pots with soap and water or a bleach solution to prevent cross contamination. African violets bloom best when in small pots. ideally only one-third the diameter of their leaf span. A plant that measures nine inches across should be in a three-inch pot.

Water: It's not possible to set a watering schedule for African violets. Instead set a daily reminder to check soil conditions and water when soil surfaces begin to dry. African violets bloom best when the roots are welldeveloped. The best roots form in very porous potting mix which is kept evenly moist at all times-never saturated nor bone dry. African violets may be watered at the soil level or by placing the pot in water. When watering at soil level, water temperature should be slightly higher than room temperature. Saturate the soil and discard excess water that drains through the bottom of the pot. If cold water touches the hairy leaves, it will cause yellowish spots or streaks on the upper leaf surfaces. Watering from the bottom may be done by placing the pot in a container to which about one inch of water is added. When the soil surface becomes moist, remove the pot, allow it to drain, and pour out the

Finally, fertilization: Water-soluble fertilizers such as 20-20-20 or 15-30-15 are commonly sold for use on African violets. Mix the fertilizer in water at one-fourth the recommended rate and apply it each time you water. Soil should be moist before dissolved fertilizer is applied. Discard excess water and fertilizer solution that drains from the bottom. A gradual loss in leaf color combined with reduced growth and flowering usually indicates that the plant needs fertilizer. Over-fertilized African violets develop tight centers and the new leaves take on a rusty appearance. Trim off the individual flowers as they fade, and when the entire cluster is gone, remove the flower stem by rocking it from side to side until it comes loose from the main stem. This trimming has the effect of increasing future blooming, so it is important to keep up with it.

excess water.

Propagation of African violets is achieved easily by leaf cuttings. Select a healthy and firm leaf from the middle of the plant and snap or cut it off at the

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stem leaving the petiole (leaf stem) intact. Trim the petiole to about 1–1½ inches in length. A combination of half vermiculite/ half sand, or half vermiculite/half potting mix makes an ideal propagation medium. Insert the petiole into the medium by pushing it into a hole. Roots normally form at the petiole base in three to four weeks, additional leaves appear three to four weeks after roots form, and flowering six to nine months later. Plants with multiple crowns can be propagated by division. Carefully divide the crowns so that each portion has some roots. Then

pot each division separately.

Pest management can be achieved with insecticidal soap sprays but leaf and flower damage may occur. Test the product on a leaf or two before spraying the entire plant. Mealy bugs may be controlled with a one to one solution of rubbing alcohol and water. Touch each insect and cottony egg mass with a cotton swab dipped in the solution. Cyclamen mites cause severe stunting of plants and are very difficult to control. Unfortunately, the best management strategy for this pest is to discard affected plants. Root diseases are usually caused by over-watering. The first sign of this problem is usually a limp, unthrifty plant. In most cases the plant should be discarded. 17

THE HISTORY CHANNEL

- **On February 26, 1917**, the Original Dixieland Jass (later Jazz) Band recorded *Livery Stable Blues*, the world's first jazz record, for the Victor Talking Machine Company in New York. That same year, the group also made the first appearance of a jazz band in a motion picture, a silent film titled *The Good for Nothing*.
- On February 27, 1938, a new mascot design was created by Chris Klein and C. Karnstadt for use by the Pontiac car brand, in the form of an Indian maiden. The theme was inspired by connections with the General Motors war chief who was employed in the GM manufacturing division.
- **On February 28, 1983**, the final episode of M*A*S*H, a series about the staff of an Army hospital during the Korean War, titled "Goodbye, Farewell and Amen," became the most-watched television episode in US history, with an estimated 106 million American viewers.
- On February 29, 2012, Davy Jones, a former teen idol and singer for The Monkees, died of a heart attack at the age of 66. Jones starred with his bandmates in a popular TV series and a few other shows during his career, later returning to his first passion of horses and becoming a jockey.
- **On March 1, 2008**, Britain's Prince Harry, who had been sent secretly to Afghanistan with his regiment in December at his request, was forced to return to Britain after the American website the Drudge Report made his deployment public.
- On March 2, 1969, the supersonic airliner and joint British/ French project Concorde set off on its maiden flight, reaching 10,000 feet and 300 mph. It would be another seven years before the plane began commercial flights, which continued until 2003, when it was retired from service.
- On March 3, 2005, Steve Fossett became the first person to fly a plane solo and nonstop around the globe without refueling, landing his Virgin Atlantic GlobalFlyer in Salina, Kansas, after a 67-hour journey. Two years later, he would disappear while flying over the Great Basin Desert, with his wrecked aircraft discovered in 2008.



Gender Identity, Come on Down!

When a person wants the **Supreme** Court to hear a case, the person files a Petition for Certiorari. In a Cert Petition, the person does not focus so much on why he or she (or they) should have won but, rather, focuses more on why it matters to the country—why the Supreme Court should decide the issue at the heart of the case.

The court is recently being asked to decide more and more gender cases for obvious reasons from both sides of the cases. One pending Petition is from the Indiana parents of a child who has a gender-dysphoria diagnosis. Indiana accused Jeremy and Mary Cox of abuse and neglect following disagreements about their child's gender iden-

tity. That state insisted that the parents respect and facilitate the child's desire to change gender. The parents said "no." The state then removed the child from the home and didn't return him, even after abuse charges were dropped. The parents say the state's custody of their child violates their rights to free speech, free exercise of religion, and parental rights to raise their child according to their values.

Another pending Petition is inviting the court to decide the constitutionality of Kentucky and **Tennessee**'s respective bans on medications and surgical procedures that attempt to bring about sex change. The challengers of these laws are parents of children diagnosed with gender dysphoria looking for these drugs and procedures to try to make their bodies more closely reflect their current ideas about what gender they are. These particular cases might not make it to the Court, but these issues will get there someday.

Barstool Briefs Short Stories on Legal Affairs

Brief Legal Briefs

These are updates on two cases I have written about. In Kirtz v. USDA, the Supreme Court ruled that a person can sue a federal lender when that lender wrongfully reports bad debt to the nation's three credit reporting companies. Kirtz's credit score was trash because the USDA was wrongfully reported a handful of unpaid USDA loans. Until this decision, a person could not sue the government for bad credit reporting (even though the law specifically says that you can!). Now you can, just like the law always said you could, but Courts are very reluctant to let citizens sue their fellow government employees.

Next case, in a landmark unanimous ruling late last week in Murray v. UBS Securities, LLC, the Supreme Court held that

> whistleblowers must only prove that his/ her protected activity (ratting out his/ her employer) was one of the factors that resulted in the whistleblower being fired or demoted. If an employee proves this much, he or she wins the case unless the employer can prove that it was going to fire or demote the employee anyway,

the tattling was not the reason. Before Murray, the employee had to prove too much, had to prove what was in the mind of the employer, and the Sarbanes-Oxley Act whistleblower provisions had no teeth.

Texas And Personal Property Rights

In Devillier vs. Texas, Richie **DeVillier** is the lead plaintiff in a consolidated case of about 80 other people who sued the state of Texas for flooding their properties that run along Interstate Highway 10 about an hour east of Houston. Until I-10 was expanded in the early 2000s, these people's land never flooded, now the interstate prevents water from flowing naturally and their land floods with every heavy rain. In the first flood of the DeVillier's property after the interstate was expanded, they lost sixty adult cows, nine vehicles, horses, calves, colts, tractors, etc. The DeVilliers and others sued Texas under State and Federal law in Texas State **Court** alleging that the interstate expansion constituted a "taking" of their property without compensation in violation of the **Fifth** Amendment which says that the government cannot take private property without paying for it.

Faced with the lawsuit, the State of Texas moved the lawsuit to Federal Court, out of Texas state court and Texas state court judges who probably own a few ranches themselves. Once the lawsuit was in Federal Court, the State of Texas argued that the Fifth Amendment's takings provision does not allow people to sue states in federal court. See what they did there? The State of Texas removed the case to Federal Court and then argued that they could not be sued in Federal Court, which should be a tricky easily identified and rejected by a court, but Texas won.

At oral argument last week, the Supreme Court Justices seemed to unanimously side with the property owners, calling Texas's argument a "bait and switch" and a "catch 22." One justice pointed out the hypocrisy of Texas' selfproclaimed property loving views while it has engaged in procedural tomfoolery to avoid rightfully paying DeVillier and the other property owners.



The City of Oxford Board of Aldermen voted on Tuesday, February 20, 2024 in favor of passing a resolution to allow a sale of the city-owned antebellum home Cedar Oaks. Voting in favor of the resolution were Aldermen Brian Hyneman of Ward III, Kesha Howell Atkinson of Ward IV, and Preston Taylor of Ward V. Voting against the resolution were Aldermen **Rick Addy** of Ward I (where Cedar Oaks is located), **Jason Bailey** of Ward VI, and new Alderman-at-Large **Mary Martha Crowe**.


Because Ward II Alderman Mark Huelse was absent from the meeting, there was a tie, which triggered Mayor Robyn Tannehill to cast a vote. Mayor Tannehill voted in favor of the resolution to allow a sale. The audience at the Board of Alderman meeting erupted in a chorus of "boos" and walked out.

On Wednesday, February 21, Mayor Tannehill posted an update to social media which read, "At 8:00 this morning the City Clerk received an email from Shane Barnett, Chairman of the House Local and Private Committee announcing that the committee would only be considering resolutions for local and private

now be March 22, 2024.

The City's vote on local and private legislation last night related to the public trust language that preceded the warranty deed from Cedar Oaks, was not passed by a unanimous vote. Therefore, Oxford will not pursue the change in Local and Private Legislation considered at last night's Board of Alderman meeting.



Although not a musician, he has always found himself an avid collector from a young age, beginning with comic books and baseball cards. "I always took really good care of my stuff," said Swider.

He credits his older sister, who turned him onto some of the popular music of the 90s, such as Smashing Pumpkins, Nirvana, and Alanis Morissete for his eventual transition to collecting records instead.

"That kind of scratched that 'collector itch' for me," he said, as he would eventually seek out entire catalogs of classic artists like John Lennon or Frank Zappa, among other common favorites for audiophiles.

"That's where I think my record buying habits were formed," said Swider, which eventually blew up in high school and college.

"I'm probably my best customer, to be honest," he laughed, "I try not to tap into my own supply, but you know, it is one of the main reasons why I opened a store, because I like to shop for records. Now I can go straight to the source, which is awesome."

End of All Music has hosted numerous events over the years, and some of his personal highlights include in-stores,

which would invite local bands to come to play. In the first location, bands and DJs come set up in the front parking lot. Swider fondly remembered one day having three bands play, when he brought his Weber grill from home and served hot dogs to visitors.

"Those were very memorable," he said, of these events that were all not only free and open to the public, but also kid-friendly.

Record Store Day was also a big draw at the original location (and continues to be), which Swider calls "the perfect start to our business," and provided great experience when it came to opening the downtown store.

"It just blows my mind to think it's been twelve years," he said. "Sometimes it still feels like one or two."



The 12th anniversary will be on Friday, March 1, and the DJ will be local writer **Jack Pendarvis**, who had also done so in the early days.

Also artist **Josh Burwell**, who has been sharing artwork at the store since it opened, will be presenting a new t-shirt.

Later that evening, all the clerks from the store will DJ at City Grocery, upstairs at the bar from 7 pm until close, doing all-vinyl sets.

"I have to thank Oxford for keeping us open for twelve years," Swider said. "Tve met so many amazing people that have now become really good friends, just from the record store being there. Also people like Richard Howorth, for

opening Square Books in 1979. And Ronzo (Ron Shapiro) and Bill Ferris' legacies. Those people that came thirty or forty years ago that have made Oxford what it is now. I kind of consider End of All Music to be keeping that torch going for them."

Also, Record Store Day is coming again on April 20, at both the Oxford location and its sister store in the **Fondren** neighborhood in

Jackson, Mississippi, which opened in October 2021. The Oxford event will have an afterparty at Circle & Square brewery.
