Oxford Community Market Kicks Off Spring & OXCM Goes to College Campus Market

Each April, **Oxford Community Market** celebrates the start of the spring growing season with its annual **Spring Kick-Off Party** at the farmer's market. Music fills the air, customers mingle, and farmers' stalls are piled high with spring favorites like tender salad greens and bright red strawberries, transforming an empty open-air pavilion into a bustling, vibrant public marketplace. This year, OXCM's 2024 Spring Kick-Off will be from 3–6:30 pm Tuesday, April 16 at the **Old Armory Pavilion** located at 1801 University Avenue.

Spring is always exciting at the farmers market but this year is extra special: OXCM is celebrating its 11th anniversary of serving the community as Oxford's only yearround weekly farmers market. This event kicks off this season's series of events to bring the community together to commemorate this milestone year for the market.

"It's been remarkable to watch this market grow over the last decade," said OXCM Director **Betsy Chapman**, who stepped in to run the market in 2014. "Sustaining this farmers market has been the ultimate group project with countless people, groups, and organizations pitching in and committing to keep it growing in spite of enormous challenges. Through the years, we've built a community of farmers, customers, volunteers, and partners to help grow and sustain the market, support our farmers, and expand our programs to improve access to healthy food."

OXCM's Spring Kick-Off is free and open to the public and will feature live music by **Firewood** featuring **Luke and Amy Fisher**, **Ricky Burkhead**, and **Lucas Leigh**, free cake from **Velvet Ditch Confections**, Chef at the Market sampling by **Ole Miss Dining**, giveaways, activities for kids, a visit from the baby goats of **Flowering Tree Farm**, and, of course, Oxford's biggest selection of locally grown spring produce and other goods from local food producers.



"Our farmers and food producers take such great pride in bringing their best to market every week," said Chapman. "In early spring, customers can find strawberries, lettuces, kale, spinach, collards, cabbages, spring onions, carrots, broccoli—all just-picked and super fresh."

Chapman added that folks can find the market again from 10–2 on Thursday, April 18, at the **OXCM Goes to College** event on Business Row at the University of Mississippi in partnership with the UM Office of Sustainability and Ole Miss Dining.


"This is a favorite spring event for our market community where we pack up and bring the whole market to campus to introduce students, faculty, and staff to their local farmers and all of the good food that is grown and produced right here in North Mississippi," Chapman said.

In addition to the campus market, OXCM is partnering with Ole Miss Dining to bring a little bit of local goodness to the university through the Farmstand Food Truck project. This project features a rotating series of local chefs and farmers serving lunch showcasing locally sourced ingredients and is open Monday through Friday from 11 am–3 pm on Business Row.

"The Farmstand provides our farmers and food producers with a great way to connect with our university community every week! We are so excited to see this project taking off and inspiring students to shop for local food from their farmers," said Chapman.



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



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Performance at Rowan Oak Tells Stories with Movement

Moving Spirits II tells the deeper story of **Rowan Oak**, interpreting the lives of the souls enslaved by **Robert Sheegog**, and the relationship between **Caroline Barr Clark** and **William Faulkner**, using historical narration, dance movement, and song. The program will take place Sunday, April 14, from 5 to 6 pm at Rowan Oak. In the event of rain, the program will take place Sunday, April 28 at the same time and location.

Moving Spirits II: A Deeper History of Roman Oak Through Movement, Dance and Song, is a site-specific dance movement performance on the grounds of Rowan Oak that uses specific locations on the property to tell the stories of the peoples and the place.

Director/choreographer Jennifer Mizenko and historian Rhondalyn Peairs have teamed up again to create an immersive physical theatre experience of the history at Rowan Oak, accompanied by original music compositions and arrangements by Damein Wash. The performance will begin at the front of the house in the circular rock garden where the system of slavery will be examined. Behind the big house, the performance will bring to life the relationship between the slave dwelling and the kitchen. An Imbongi (African prophet) will take us forward to experience the relationship between Caroline Barr Clark and William Faulkner. And the performance will end with catharsis as we witness George running to freedom.

"Inspiration for this performance came in the fall of 2022 during a University of Mississippi Slavery Research Group Meeting. Based on our collaboration in the fall of 2019, Rhondalyn and I set out to create a new work at Rowan Oak that goes beyond what is commonly known," said director/choreographer Jennifer Mizenko. "It is important to me the story is told on the site where it happened, because the spirits of these people are alive in the soil and the atmosphere of Rowan Oak."

The cast of twenty is made up of local Oxonians and is multi-generational (ages 12–84) and multicultural. Most of these individuals have little to no experience, but a big desire to tell the stories of people who stories have not been told.

Cast member **Rachel Coleman** states, "I found the first Moving *Spirits* very powerful. They tackled important experiences and stories that are hard to hear, and I imagine, hard to embody. But it was done with great care and reverence for the 'spirits' and the dancers. I am excited about participating in such a powerful project, bringing important and untold stories to light."



Joan Wilkins, whose entire family is involved in the project, from her grandchildren to her parents, said she is part of the project because, "I grew up in this town and moved away, partly because I never felt like I belonged here. Now that I am back, I feel more comfortable, and I want to help bring our history to life for people who really need and want to know about it." She further states, "My parents would probably say that this is the first opportunity in their lifetime that they have been able to see the races interact with each other in a positive way. They grew up in the 50s and 60s when this type of project would not have been possible."

The audience will stand amongst the performers and follow the story from site to site. Good walking shoes are recommended. The performance is free of charge and will last approximately 40 minutes, with a Q&A afterward. A golf cart will be provided for anyone with ambulatory challenges, and a limited number of camper chairs will be available for those who need to sit during the performance.

This project is sponsored by The Mississippi Hills Heritage Area Alliance, The University of Mississippi, Volunteer Mississippi, The Center for the Study of Southern Culture, Rowan Oak, The Yoknapatawpha Arts Council, The Oxford Tourism Council, and The Mississippi Humanities Council.

Rowan Oak is located at 916 Old Taylor Road. Due to limited parking, ride-sharing is encouraged, or you may park at the museum and take a nice walk through **Bailey's Woods**.



They've reached the ends of their coping mechanisms and bank accounts and are making terrible life choices and trying to recover in the wake of them. We've got folks who can't let go of the past, folks obsessed with sex and music, lovers stuck in dismal relationships, and clueless romantics who probably need their asses whipped. Heartbreak piles up like car crashes in the fog, and everybody just has to carry on like everything's fine. These stories keep hitting the funny/sad notes, and with his scalpel-tip sentences, Hipp marches readers through the wringer, with great compassion for the lost and searching.

Max Hipp is a teacher, writer, and musician from **Oxford**, **Mississippi**. He teaches literature and creative writing at the **University of Mississippi**.
