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

It's Festival Time! Double Decker is April 26 & 27

The annual Double Decker Arts Fest continues to bring a balanced variety to suit all tastes and ages.

Double Decker month is underway in Oxford, Mississippi, and the excitement and anticipation throughout town is palpable, as the huge yearly, two-day production continues exploring new heights, brimming with surprises.

The largest festival in North Mississippi, and biggest the musicians.

free festival in the state, is set to celebrate its 27th year, and the city is gearing up again to showcase remarkable, world-class music/visual arts and food culture.

Recently voted "Best Small College Town" in a *USA Today* poll, Oxford has seldom maintained such positive national attention and allure. For **Visit Oxford**—the local tourist information and visitor's center that works in conjunction with numerous sponsors and other parts of the community—this most certainly is cause for great pride for its ongoing efforts.

There can't possibly be any one weekend of the year that fits perfectly for everyone's schedule, but the perennially late-April event, which falls this year on the 26th and 27th, is about as dialed in as it's ever going

to be.

Generally a busy but prime time of year for mid-South outdoor events, before too many critters are in the air or portable fans are needed, April is a time of year when University students are still in town and parents are likely to pay a visit.

Because it's a popular season throughout the region for music and arts festivals, springtime is more feasible for performing artists, and they can anticipate that it will consistently fall around the same weekend. When it comes to routing a tour, many full-time musicians set their schedules as far as a year or two out.

It also doesn't hurt the local economy to have the financial resources of parental attend-

ees, as opposed to broke college students, which might be the case if it happened another time of year, because after all, over half of the funding goes towards paying the musicians.

"We want to do it when the parents can come visit," said Visit Oxford Executive Director **Kinney Ferris**, who has watched the festival grow steadily throughout her tenure with the tourism center—aside from the two years that were canceled due to Covid.

With regards to those who might prefer the festival move to a slower time of year, Ferris said that she is always willing to hear out community members for their reasoning, but that the festival will remain around the same dates for the foreseeable future,

"for a lot of reasons."

Ferris revels in the general mission of putting on the event, which is to provide a little something for everyone, including a consistently diverse music line-up that always provides a little something for all tastes. For instance, the Alumni Association **Rebel Road Trip** is included in the

program this year, which invites Rebel coaches and University leadership to stage as part of an eightcity tour.

Ole Miss Head Football Coach Lane Kiffin is among the coaches in the caravan, as well as Vice-Chancellor for Intercollegiate Athletics Keith Carter, and Alumni Association CEO Kirk Purdom.

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



Robyn Tannehill to receive University of Mississippis award at April 22, 2024 arts extravaganza at The Ford Center.

The University of Mississippi's Institute for the Arts spotlights faculty and student talent in this incredible showcase of the arts encompassing music, film, art, theater, and creative writing during the **2024** Medal for the Arts. The institute will present Robyn Tannehill with the Medal for the Arts at 7:30 pm April 22 in the Gertrude C. Ford Center for the Performing Arts. The ceremony and concert is produced by the university's Living Music Resource (LMR).

Tannehill created the **Double Decker** Arts Festival, which showcases Oxford as a town that supports the arts, in 1996. As then-director of the Oxford Tourism

Council, she grew the festival through ingenuity, perseverance and grassroots efforts with community partners to promote music, food, and art.

"Robyn Tannehill has been instrumental in the transformation of the city of Oxford into an arts scene, placing Oxford and the state of Mississippi on a national scale," said Nancy Maria Balach, chair of the Department of Music and director of the Institute for the Arts and the LMR. "She is responsible for so much of the growth and visibility of Oxford.

"Investing in art and culture is an investment in the creativity of the city itself," Tannehill said. "I believe our decisions regarding local develop-

ment at all levels and by all sectors should be based on an understanding of cultural—not just economic and environmental—impact.

Designed along the lines of the Kennedy Center Honors, which selects honorees for lifetime artistic achievements, the Medal for the Arts program will feature musical performances by Ole Miss faculty and students, installations of art and a short film on Tannehill's life.

The mayor is the third recipient of the Medal for the Arts. The inaugural award in 2022 was given posthumously to Jim Weatherly, of Brentwood, Tennessee, renowned songwriter and Ole Miss alumnus. The 2023 award went to alumnus Glen Ballard, of Hollywood, California, a songwriter, lyricist and record producer.

"Presenting the Medal for the Arts to Robyn is a wonderful way to celebrate the partnership between the university and Oxford because they would not exist without each other," said Brady Bramlett, director of development, executive managing director of LMR and co-creator of the Medal for the Arts with Balach. "Ole Miss has a deep legacy of producing successful artists who have begun their journeys here or who have touched this university in some shape or form."



The evening will spotlight students and faculty from many creative departments campus-wide.

Prior to the ceremony, an art exhibit featuring an array of student works, curated by Brooke P. Alexander, Instructional Assistant Professor of Art, will be on view in the lobby of the Ford Center. Artists Ellis Barber, Victoria Ellis, Peyton Lawler, Jon Tae McCall, Angel Morgan, Denzel Foster, Claire Baskin, and Nicolette Boyd will be in attendance and eager to answer questions and discuss their work.

Ford Center Studio A for a preview of The Turn of the Screw's set, cast, and characters.

In the spirit of Double Decker, Medal for the Arts will showcase established talent and introduce new artists. The night will feature an array of performances beginning with a group at the inaugural Double Decker, the Steel Drum Ensemble directed by Ricky Burkhead.

Other feature performers include Noreen Campo, poet and graduate student in English; Benton Donahue,

collaborative pianist and undergraduate student in Music/ Women's Council/Living Music Resource; Fred Hadley, trombonist and graduate student in Music; Adrienne Park, collaborative pianist and Assistant Professor of Collaborative Piano; John Carden, Assistant Professor of Musical Theatre; and Annalise Caudle, Instructional Assistant Professor of Lighting Design. In addition to performances, visual art will be integral to the evening's experience as the work of Department of Art faculty will be showcased.

The evening will also showcase emerging songstress Izzy Arthurs, English major, Sally McDonnell Barksdale Honors College student, and Stamps Recipient. In the qualifier round of TN Songwriters Week, Izzy secured a top spot in Memphis. During the week 1,200 songwriters performed in 50 venues across the state. Izzy and six other finalists will go on to perform at the historic Bluebird Cafe in Nashville.



Ferris and other organizers have arrived at the number 150 for what they believe is a suitable amount of booths, considering the overall size of the event.

"We feel like we've got the art vendor thing under control. We just know our limits. We are sort of landlocked," Ferris joked. She feels that adding any more booths would jeopardize the vendors' premium spots. Although

Ferris and fellow-producers make it a goal not to edge out any regional artists, she does admit that it can be quite strenuous and "grueling" to set up a base, then take it down afterwards. In light of this fact, the festival has consistently welcomed new vendors as well as seasoned locals.

"We've brought in some new artists, which is fun and exciting. And then there's some that have done it every single year."

It's much about the music

While a handful of the Double Decker musical performers of the past have returned to the line-up—and continue to do so this year—others will be joining the fest for the first time after years of discussion. Headlining this year is talented guitarist/singer-songwriter Brittany Howard, well known as leader of the Athens, Alabama, rock band Alabama Shakes, which formed in 2009 and enjoyed mainstream success.

"We've been talking to her for quite some time," said Ferris.

Also happy about Howard headlining this year's festival is **Scott Caradine**, owner of beloved Oxford restaurant and music venue Proud Larry's.

"I'm thrilled about having Brittany on the lineup," said Caradine. "I think watching her progress from

shared with the audience of the Kelly Clarkson Show. Caradine described Howard's new record as "a wide range of funk, soul, and rock, with some elements of jazz."


Although perhaps not as catered to local musicians as in the days of yore, this year's lineup may have more ties to the area than one might assume.

Caradine referred to Kingfish as an "ambassador of Mississippi and the blues all over the world," who hasn't played locally in a few

years "because he's been out

Kingfish's second album 662 earned him a GRAMMY Award for Best Contemporary Blues album and has also won each of the ten Blues Music Awards nominations received—on top of eleven Living Blues Awards.

"We love the blues around here," said Caradine. "I think people will be really excited to come see him."

The local ties continue with another singer-songwriter/guitarist, and return-performer Charlie Mars, who has spent much of his days residing in Lafayette and Yalobusha Counties, and has appeared on *Austin City Limits*, the longest running music series in television history.

Ties to the legends of the North Mississippi blues community don't get any stronger than Kenny **Brown**, who has recorded and performed shows around Oxford for decades and appears on many of the greatest Mississippi Hill Country Blues albums ever recorded, including with late-greats R.L. Burnside and Junior Kimbrough.

Brown continues to reach higher plateaus year-after-year, having recently played appearances as well as recorded with world-famous rock group the Black Keys, and Hank Williams, Jr., and Robert Finley.

Brown is also cofounder of the annual North Mississippi Hill Country Picnic with wife Sara, which this year falls on June 28–29. Kenny will kick off the Saturday festivities with a 10 am set. The return of the morning slot (as the festival originally was) is an added treat for goers this year.

Another band on the lineup with local ties is Bass Drum of Death, with bandleader John Bar-

> rett originally hailing from Oxford, before residing in New York City for some time and then returning.

"I think that it's pretty special that we've got local bands that have enough going on musically, and globally, that they make an impact on our festival

here in Oxford," said Caradine. "I think that the festival's going to be really cool for that aspect... that we've got some local bands on there that have real traction all over

Friday night country kickoff

This year also marks the third year for the Friday night country music series, which Caradine is also very pleased about, after having famous Arkansan singer/songwriter, **Ash**ley McBryde perform in '23.


Teenage guitar-slinging phenom Grace Bowers, who has been gathering acclaim from a laundry list of famous musicians since wooing a capacity crowd at last year's Newport Folk Festival, begins the free live music at 6 pm on Friday.

"She'll be one of those people that five or ten years from now we're gonna go, 'wow, remember when she played at Double Decker in that early Friday slot?" said Caradine of the Gibson guitar-endorsed player. "It's going to be one of those things..."

She's followed by another youthful yet seasoned performer, 23-year-old Conner Smith, who has been described as "matching a honeyed vocal to propulsive hints of bluegrass and the warmth of '90s Country," with "an instant-classic sound infused with riveting modern appeal."

Caradine described Conner Smith as a "young, up and coming country artist with some real traction on the radio, which enables us to keep some of that radio familiarity with country music on the bill, while still doing something different."

The Friday country series will conclude with Flatland Cavalry, who will surely delight festival goers with their distinctly West Texas Panhandle sound, having started out in the very musically



Stick around the festival for a surprise

For festival goers who can stick it out for the Saturday night headliner Brittany Howard, Farris said there will be a "new component" that will occur right before Howard begins. "It's going to be a surprise," she said.

"Visit Oxford is more of a marketing organization, although we do put on events from time to time it's not kind of our main gig," said Ferris.

She called the festival "a lot of fun" to help put together, mainly because of how it's a vehicle to market the City of Oxford "in a really big public way. To me it just has all the things that we're promoting year round about Oxford, which is a very community-driven place," said Ferris.

"This is kind of a big community party, and we bring in the arts aspect—which we thrive in here in the arts—whether it's musical or visual arts. I think we're celebrating all the things fun about Oxford. We're bringing it all together with the community behind it, and the students and the university...in a special place, in the heart of the city. It's really special and there's a reason why it's award-winning. And there's a reason why when [people] think of Oxford, they think of Double Decker Arts Festival and its great legacy. We're honored to carry it on here at the tourism office and Visit Oxford. It's been 27 years, which is amazing. Not a lot of festivals can say that."

Caradine, whose restaurant/music venue was only in its infancy when the festival started, is also impressed by its almost-three-decade endurance.

"I think that each time we have seen the festival grow...and it's done that for years," said Caradine. "And we've had more sponsorships and more interest in what seems like really big crowds. We want to try to think outside the box a little bit; we want to do things that are fresh and different but at the same time keep things that people know and love, and connect with in Mississippi."



Kyle McGrevey Fixes Oxford 20 Years of Computer Repair

How did you get started running a computer repair service 20 years ago?

I had a job on campus at Weir Hall in the IT department at Ole Miss. I didn't realize people actually did this and made money, but there were people who came in needing help that [IT] didn't provide. There was a list of students they could call and pay them for repairs, and I realized that I knew how to do it all, so I got my name on the list and started getting calls. Very quickly I started making more than I did at the help desk there, so, I expanded from there. It turned into a full-time job basically overnight.

Were you one of those kids that always had a computer, and was tearing it apart?

Oh yeah, for sure! I built my first computer when I was, I think, ten. Like for Christmas from Santa. I used to have to give my mom detailed lists of the parts that I wanted and where to buy them, so she knew what to get. I wanted RAM or a hard drive or whatever!

When I met you, you had a desk inside Copy Time, now The Lyric.

Yep, and we were basically just working in a hallway. From 04 to 05, I was out of my house and strictly just did house calls, driving to people's locations. And then we moved into that spot in The Lyric around '05 or '06. We were busy at The Lyric, and I was busy out of my house. But when we moved into the spot on Jackson Avenue with more visibility, we had, of course, more people with computers.

When I first came to Ole Miss, you still turned in a lot of stuff handwritten, and most people didn't have computers. If you did, it was a desktop. Nobody had laptops, right? [Most people] had to go to the computer lab if they wanted to use a computer.

It was kind of right then when it was transitioning to where people were using them more. Laptops became reasonably priced, and [more] people started getting them. Then malware became a thing, pop-up ads hadn't existed [before], and now everybody

was getting on the Internet. So it was good timing, getting on it when everybody started to get computers and depending on them more, coupled with all of a sudden all these nefarious actors coming in like virus and malware.

Now you get desktops, laptops, tablets, phones, and I'm sure all other stuff.

We fix tons of PlayStations. We get lots of game consoles. But I'd say these days, we're probably 40 percent computers, probably like 45-ish percent phones, and then the rest is game consoles and miscellaneous stuff.

I remember, I think in 06 or 07, I was riding around The Square on a motorcycle and there was an original iPhone 3G laying on the ground that fell out of somebody's car. I stopped and picked it up. It had a cracked screen, and I actually fixed it; I tracked the guy down. And then I [realized], oh we can we can fix phones now. I had no idea it was going to become a majority of our business.

What year did you switch over from Express Computer Service to UbreakIfix, and why did you decide to do that?

It think it was in 2019. UbreakIfix is an authorized Samsung Service Center, authorized Google Service Center. We do all the Asurion and all the insurance work for AT&T and Verizon and Cricket and several other big companies—these big national contracts I wouldn't have been able to land as an independent store. So I joined them for that [reason], and it a big change. But it's proven to be good. It's really kept us alive and allowed us to expand way beyond what I could have done by myself.

In 2022, you sold your store, what happened?

A big international insurance company bought UbreakIfix as a corporate entity, and then they decided they wanted to run all the stores at a corporate level rather than owned by franchisees. So they made offers to a lot of the owners and said, we'll take over your store.

I definitely needed a break. I was starting to get kind of worn out, and it was a pretty good offer, so I took it. I felt bad. I felt like I was losing my identity, you know? But it was nice that I had time off, about 13 months. I traveled a lot, and slept, ate on The Square a lot. I went to Istanbul for like a month, did a lot of traveling around the US.

Then they changed the strategy. Rather than focusing on corporate running them, they wanted more local owners, people more invested at a local level. So, they ended up reselling the stores. I had to bid on it against other owners. In the system, they only sold to top performers, and luckily I had opened a store in Tupelo that kept me in the running, or I wouldn't have been able to buy it back. But our Tupelo store was running so well that it qualified me to make an offer to get this store back.



Now you have the Tupelo store, the Oxford store, and something in Alabama too?

That's right. About the same time that I took the store back here, I launched operations in Huntsville and Birmingham; we don't have actual storefronts there, we just drive around in vans and fix stuff at people's homes.

Do you have any advice for people to maintain their equipment?

Definitely don't drop it. Don't spill anything on it. And if you have kids, anytime you let your kids get on your work computer, inevitably it's gonna have problems.

It seems youve gotten into a more relaxed work stride.

Luckily, I have a real good team in place that I can depend on. We figured out a lot of stuff with trial and error. I'm definitely less stressed than before I sold it, and somehow doing more. I'm not quite sure how that works.

I guess one of the main parts of [starting a business] was to afford to eat [out]. I wanted to eat at L&M and Two Stick, and I definitely couldn't afford it at the time. That was a motivating factor.

I love all of Oxford's restaurants, you know. I'm pretty much on The Square almost every night having dinner, and I love all our local favorites—SoLa, City Grocery, Snackbar, Jinsei. We have the Oxford restaurant scene to thank for the repair shop here.

Local Correspondence: Oxford's Tree Canopy

I love trees. I grew up under and in them. Four beautiful maple trees graced our front yard, and we had an apple orchard in the back. On Sunday afternoons when I was supposed to be napping, I would sneak out the back door and disappear into tree canopy. My favorite was the huge crab apple tree. There I would sit for hours, reading and listening to the birds.

In 1986 when Oxford became our home, the city had marvelous tree canopy. This was also the case in 2005 according to Oxford's Master Tree Plan of 2005.

- "[...] the residential areas of Oxford have many more trees than the commercial area [...]The most pleasing streets and neighborhoods in Oxford are those with a strength of unity due to a consistent use of trees. [...]" (MTP 23).
- The Master Plan lists many statistics about the benefits of trees. Just a few of these are:
- "The net cooling effect of a healthy (mature) tree is equivalent to ten room-size air-conditioners operating 20 hours a day. - U.S. Department of Agriculture"
- "Landscaping, especially with trees, can increase property values as much as 20 percent. - Management Information Services/ ICMA"
- "The planting of trees means improved water quality, resulting in less runoff and erosion. This allows more recharging of the ground water supply. Wooded areas help prevent the transport of sediment and chemicals into streams. - USDA Forest Service" (MTP 5,6).

How and why have we forgotten this?

One of the new developments lies just down the street from me. I must choose cloudy days to walk through it, for fear of heat stroke. I see house upon house, upon house, with artful landscaping of a few small bushes on the tiny front lawns. The homes are close enough that I believe second floor neighbors can reach across and hold hands. But most importantly, there are *no* tall, shady trees. A few tiny newly planted trees are visible here and there. But no tall shade trees were saved. None.

Besides economic and ecosystem benefits of tree canopies, you know that there are also social and psychological benefits.

Students perform better when they can see trees, trees help people be less anxious, and studies show that there is less crime in areas of high tree canopy (https://citygreen.com and Nuccitelli 2023). Mosquitos

Mosquitoes breed in stagnant water. Since they are blood-sucking insects they may transmit several diseases, such as malaria and West Nile virus. Mosquitoes are best controlled by using multiple strategies.

Control efforts should always begin with education! Learn about mosquitoes, where they breed, how people can prevent mosquito breeding, and personal protection measures available to use against them.

PROTECTION

Cover arms and legs with long sleeves and long skirts or pants.

Avoid mosquito-prone areas in the mornings and evenings when mosquitoes are most active.

USE a recommended mosquito repellent Containing Deet, Picaridin or IR3535

Aerosol or pump sprays apply the product evenly over skin and clothing.

Use creams, lotions or sticks to cover small areas of exposed skin.

Immediately wash with soap and water to remove repellents off skin when you return indoors.

Always keep insect repellents out of the reach of children.

USE Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus (p-Mentane-3,8-diol, or PMD) which is the synthetic form of an ingredient in eucalyptus leaves and twigs. Oil of lemon eucalyptus has been tested against mosquitoes found in the US and provides protection like repellents with 15%-20% concentrations of DEET. Oil of lemon eucalyptus products should not be used on children under the age of three, as it has not been assessed on this age group.

NOTE: *lemon eucalyptus oil* should not replace Oil of Lemon

Eucalyptus. Lemon eucalyptus oil has not been assessed nor approved as an effective repellent.



DON'T

Apply products to eyes, lips, mouth, over cuts, wounds or irritated skin.

Over-apply to the skin, saturate clothing.

Apply to skin beneath clothing, or to skin that is not exposed.

Apply more often than recommended on the product label.

PREVENTION

Remove sources of standing water around your home where mosquitoes can breed; ensure window screens are intact.

Discard or empty tin cans, old tires, buckets,

unused plastic swimming pools or other containers that collect and hold water. Empty flowerpot saucers, urns, or pet dishes every 2 days.

EXTENSION

Clean debris from rain gutters. Be sure flat roofs are not holding water.

Check faucets and air conditioner units for leaks and repair as needed.

Change the water in birdbaths and wading pools weekly or more often.

Stock ornamental pools with top feeding predacious minnows, also known as mosquito fish or treat ornamental pools with biorational larvicides [Bacillus thuringiensis subsp. israelensis (Bti), "Mosquito Dunks" and "Mosquito Bits," Wellmark International's Pre-Strike Mosquito Torpedo that kills developing mosquitoes using insect growth regulator (IGR) technology.

Fill or drain puddles, ditches and swampy areas. Fill tree holes and stumps with mortar.

Eliminate seepage from cisterns, cesspools, and septic tanks.

Eliminate standing water around watering troughs. Flush livestock water troughs twice a week.

Check for trapped water in tarps used to cover boats, pools, or other items. Arrange the tarp to drain the water.

Ensure that proper backfilling and

grading prevent drainage problems after construction or other projects.

Irrigate lawns and gardens carefully to prevent standing water.

If ditches do not flow and water stagnates for more than five days, they can produce large numbers of mosquitoes. Report such conditions to the Public Health Office before clearing, as they may be protected by wetland regulations.

The LarvaSonic uses sound energy transmitted into water at the resonant frequency of the mosquito larvae air bladders. The device instantly ruptures the internal tissue and causes mosquito larval death.
