Double Decker 2026 Continues Blue Delta Blues Alley Stage Block Party Vibe Emphasizes Oxford Roots

Blue Delta Jeans Co. is once again stitching itself into the fabric of one of Oxford's biggest weekends, bringing a second stage of live music to the Double Decker Arts Festival with a blend of hometown pride and grassroots creativity.

For General Manager **Brian Baldwin**, the partnership between Blue Delta Jeans and the festival grew organically out of friendships and a shared desire to elevate an already beloved event. What began as a casual post-pandemic collaboration has quickly developed into a meaningful extension of the Double Decker experience.

"In that first year, we just wanted to help however we could," Baldwin explained, recalling 2021, when live music on the Square was limited.

Blue Delta stepped in with a modest setup, hosting just two acts—including local favorites **Joe Austin & The Tallahatchies** and bluesman **Jimmy "Duck" Holmes**—but the response made it clear they were onto something.

Since then, the company's involvement has grown significantly. What started as a flatbed trailer squeezed into a parking space has evolved into a full-scale production. This year marks the third consecutive festival featuring Blue Delta's expanded stage, now located near the intersection behind **The Lyric on South 11th Street**. With professional sound and a street-blocking setup, Baldwin says the goal is to create "a true old-school Mississippi block party."

That sense of atmosphere is intentional. Blue Delta, known for its custom, one-on-one approach to denim, brings the same philosophy to live music—favoring authenticity and connection. The stage's tucked-away location, framed by buildings and shaded by spring trees, creates a natural acoustic pocket where sound carries and crowds gather comfortably.

turing veteran players who once toured the Southeast college circuit, the band represents a bridge between generations—something Baldwin sees as central to the stage's purpose.

"You've got younger folks discovering music that's been around for decades, and older folks reconnecting with it," he said. "That's a special thing."

Beyond the music itself, Blue Delta's involvement also highlights the broader cultural identity of Oxford—a town where business, art, and community often intersect. The festival weekend brings together customers and visitors from across the country, many who will experience the brand and the city in tandem. "It's more than just a stage," Baldwin said. "It's about creating a place where people can gather, enjoy great music, and be part of something that feels uniquely Oxford."

As Double Decker continues to grow, Blue Delta's second stage stands as a testament to how local partnerships can add depth to a signature event—one song, and one great party—at a time. **TV**

"We like to throw a good party," Baldwin said. "And this weekend is one where we really try to put our best foot forward."

The lineup reflects that spirit, mixing emerging local acts with established regional names. Young Americana group **Single Wide** will open the day, while Austin and his band return as crowd favorites. Headlining the stage are the **Kudzu Kings**, a legendary Mississippi outfit whose blend of rock, country, and jam-band sensibilities has earned them a devoted following across the South.

For Baldwin, one of the most meaningful bookings is **The Mississippi Diggs**, a group with deep ties to the local music scene. Fea-

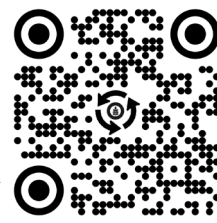

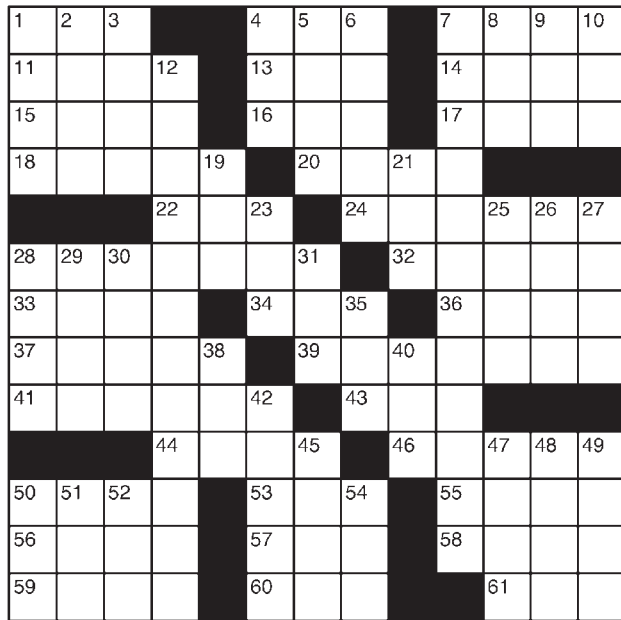

5. "Beechwood 4-5789," by the Marvelettes, in 1962. In the song, a girl is interested in a guy, so she gives him her phone number. Years ago phone numbers were identified by exchange names. This Beechwood phone number would have been written as BE 4-5789. The BE in Beechwood was a 2 and a 3 on the phone, so the number was actually 234-5789.

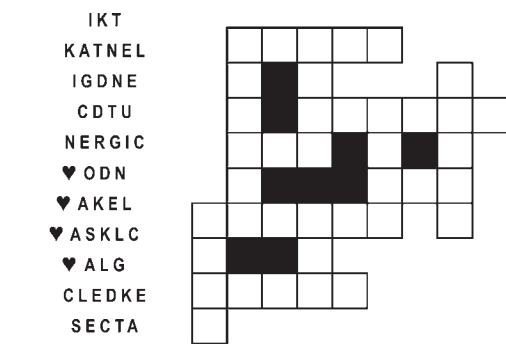
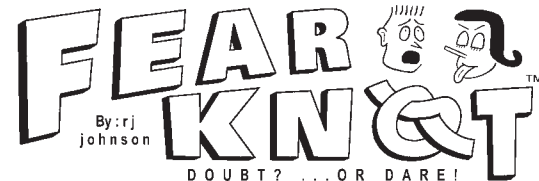


MAGIC MAZE ● COWBOYS

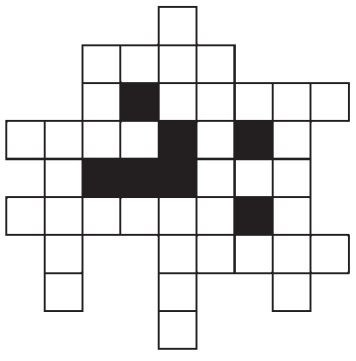

Double Decker Arts Festival

Big Names, Local Roots

When April rolls into Oxford, anticipation builds for the city's most iconic event—the **Double Decker Arts Festival**. Now in its 29th year, the festival has become a defining tradition for the community, drawing thousands to the historic Square for a weekend filled with live music, regional art, and the unmistakable energy that sets Oxford apart.

Behind the scenes, however, the festival is anything but routine. **Visit Oxford Executive Director Kinney Ferris** describes the preparation as a careful balance between consistency and constant refinement. "It's plug and play from years prior," she said, "but we're always tweaking things that didn't go well." That philosophy has helped sustain Double Decker's growth while preserving the character that longtime attendees have come to expect.

A Festival That Keeps Growing

One important area of focus in recent years has been security and logistics. Though largely invisible to festivalgoers, the planning involved is extensive. Ensuring safety and managing the flow of thousands of visitors requires months of preparation and collaboration. "It's not something people see," Ferris noted, "but it's there." The goal is simply to create a space where people can gather freely and comfortably, even as the scale of the event continues to expand.

That growth presents its own challenges. The festival remains centered around Oxford's historic Square, a setting that gives Double Decker its charm but also limits its physical footprint. "We're somewhat landlocked," Ferris explains. Still, organizers keep exploring new ways to maximize space—whether by rethinking layouts, or by identifying additional areas that could support vendors and performances in future years.

Despite its longevity, Double Decker is far from static. Organizers are already thinking ahead - not just to this year's event, but to future milestones, including the eventual 30th festival.



A Standout Music Lineup

While logistics shape the experience behind the curtain, the festival's heartbeat remains its music—and the 2026 lineup may be one of its strongest yet.

The weekend kicks off **Friday, April 24**, with a trio of dynamic performances. Nashville-based **Penelope Road** opens the evening at 6 pm, bringing a groove-driven blend of classic soul influences and modern energy. At 7:30 pm, **The War and Treaty** take the stage, delivering their signature fusion of gospel, country, and soul, powered by the electrifying chemistry of **Michael and Tanya Trotter**. Closing out the night at 9 pm, **Shane Smith & The Saints** offer a high-octane mix of country, folk, and roadhouse rock—an act known for its relentless touring and commanding live presence.

Saturday's schedule expands into a full day of music, beginning at 11:30 am with **Annie & The Caldwell's**, a family group from **West Point, Mississippi**, whose uplifting blend of gospel and soul sets an early tone of joy and connection. From there, the lineup moves fluidly across genres and regions.

Austin trio **The Animeros** take the stage at 1 pm, weaving Latin rhythms with psychedelic soul, followed by **Birmingham's Mountain Grass Unit** at 2:30 pm, a young band pushing bluegrass into new territory with elements of jazz, funk, and rock. By mid-afternoon, **The Heavy Heavy** bring a dose of retro-inspired rock and roll at 4 pm, channeling the spirit of the '60s and '70s while keeping their sound fresh and immediate.

As the evening builds, **Seattle's The Dip** delivers a horn-driven blend of rhythm and blues at 5:30 pm, setting the stage for one of the festival's most celebrated voices. **Margo Price** takes over at 7 pm, continuing her reputation

as one of modern country's most fearless and compelling artists. Finally, the weekend crescendos with **Wilco** at 8:30 pm, the legendary band whose genre-defying catalog and enduring influence make them a fitting headliner for a festival of this scale.

The depth of the lineup hasn't gone unnoticed by those embedded in Oxford's music scene. Talent buyer and **Proud Larry's** owner **Scott Caradine** summed it up best: "When people ask me, who should I make sure to see this year, I would tell everyone—I think there is a great chance that every band on this year's lineup will blow you away!"

For Ferris, the strength of the lineup lies not just in its star power, but in its balance. Established names share the bill with emerging artists, giving audiences a chance to discover new favorites alongside familiar ones. "We're thrilled that we can say they were here with us at a free festival," she says—a reminder of Double Decker's accessibility and its commitment to offering high-caliber performances to all.

The Power of Partnership

Double Decker's success depends heavily on community partnerships, and Ferris is quick to highlight the role of sponsors in making the festival possible.

At the forefront is **Ole Miss Athletics**, the festival's presenting sponsor for more than a decade. In a gesture that speaks to Oxford's collaborative spirit, the organization donates its naming rights to the **University Museum**—an arts institution that might not otherwise have the opportunity to sponsor such a large-scale event.

"I just think that's really special," Ferris says. "It's kind of who Oxford is and the way we all work together."



Other longtime supporters, including **Nicholas Air**, contribute to key aspects, while a wide range of local businesses provide both financial backing and hands-on support. From banks and real estate firms to restaurants and service providers, the festival draws on a broad network of community involvement.

Some contributions are especially substantial. Catering from local favorite **My Michelle's** keeps performers and crews fueled throughout the weekend, while companies like **NE SPARC** provide essential infrastructure such as internet access for festival operations. Even unexpected partnerships have emerged. In the wake of a recent ice storm, cleanup contractor **Debris Tech** stepped forward to sponsor the festival as a way of giving back to the community—a gesture Ferris described as both surprising and meaningful.

Vendors from Across the Region

Art remains at the heart of Double Decker, and the festival's vendor marketplace is a major draw. Each year, approximately 150 booths line the Square and surrounding

streets, featuring artists and craftspeople from across the Southeast. These vendors offer a wide array of handmade goods, from paintings and sculptures to jewelry, textiles, and more. For many attendees, browsing the booths is just as important as the music.

Despite festival organizers continuing to explore ways to expand in the future, potentially adding new areas to accommodate the growing demand, the number of vendors has remained relatively steady due to space limitations. "We want our vendors to be successful," Ferris says, emphasizing the importance of an environment where artists can thrive while contributing to the experience.

From sponsors and vendors to volunteers and city officials, countless individuals play a role in bringing the festival to life. That collaborative spirit is part of what makes Oxford unique, and it's something visitors can feel as they move through the crowds. Even areas like "**Sponsor Row**," where businesses set up booths with information and giveaways, become part of the experience offering opportunities for discovery and connection.

Looking Ahead

As Double Decker approaches its 29th year, it stands as both a tradition and a living, evolving event. Organizers are already looking ahead to future milestones, considering how to expand and improve while staying true to the festival's roots.

For now, the focus is on the upcoming weekend—on the music, the art, and the thousands of people who will gather in the heart of Oxford to celebrate. "It's worked this many years," Ferris says. "And we hope to keep it going for a long time."

With its blend of creativity and careful planning, the Double Decker Arts Festival remains a defining part of Oxford's identity—a weekend when the city comes alive, and everyone is invited along for the ride.

For Joe Austin, stepping onto a stage in Oxford, Mississippi, during the Double Decker Arts Festival isn't just another gig—it's a full-circle moment shaped by Mississippi roots, and years spent honing his craft.

Born and raised in Pontotoc, Austin grew up surrounded by the sounds that would come to define his music—blues, gospel harmonies, and the informal tradition of front porch pickin' among family and friends. His earliest inspiration came from his grandfather, a fingerstyle guitarist who passed down both his instrument and his influence.

After his grandfather's death, Austin inherited that guitar—a turning point that pushed him from observer to player. Not long after, he picked up the fiddle as well, expanding a sound that would later blend country storytelling with Mississippi grit.

That foundation eventually carried him to college on a music scholarship, followed by time performing professionally out of Nashville and Memphis. A stint in Texas beginning in 2014 broadened his reach even further, where he collaborated, produced, and immersed himself in a thriving songwriter scene before ultimately returning to North Mississippi in recent years.

Now based in Oxford, Austin performs with his band, The Tallahatchies—a group whose members bring their own regional influences from across the South, creating a sound that feels both rooted and wide-ranging.

That sense of place and continuity makes Double Decker feel like more than just a date on the calendar.

"It's Double Decker Festival—it's the biggest thing that happens in Oxford," Austin said. "To get to be a part of it, it's always fun."

This year, Austin and his band will once again take part in the Blue Delta "Blues Alley" Stage, a tucked-away performance space that has quietly become one of the festival's most distinctive settings. What started several years ago as a modest flat-bed trailer setup has grown into a fully realized stage, while still maintaining its intimate, discovery-driven atmosphere.

"It's a cool little deal," Austin said. "They bring in a lot of different acts . . . and it sounds really good out in that alley."

Austin has been part of Blues Alley since its early days, watching it evolve alongside

the festival itself. The stage—helped along by Blue Delta Jeans and local collaborators—offers an alternative to the larger, more crowded areas of Double Decker, giving artists a chance to connect more directly with listeners.

For Austin, that connection is central to what he does.

His music carries the weight of his upbringing, and lived-in authenticity that reflects years of playing small rooms, festival stages, and everything in between. It's a style that doesn't rely on flash, but leans into feel and storytelling.

And while the band's live performances remain a cornerstone, Austin is also looking ahead creatively.

"We're getting ready to start a new record," he said. "This one, I want to take a little more time to polish it a little more."

That marks a shift from his previous project, which was recorded entirely DIY—tracked live to an old tape machine at his bass player's house. The next release, he says, will likely involve a studio setting, signaling a move toward a more refined sound while still holding onto the organic elements that define his work.

Even so, the idea of capturing something raw hasn't gone away. Austin noted that a live recording remains a possibility—an approach that would mirror the energy his band brings to stages like Blues Alley.

That energy is exactly what festival-goers can expect this year. In a space surrounded by brick walls and festival foot traffic, the setting lends itself to the kind of performance that feels immediate and unfiltered.

And in a festival that continues to grow in size and scope, those moments—slightly off the main path, a little less polished, but deeply authentic can often be the ones that stick.

Wilco is one of the most influential and innovative bands in American music. Formed in Chicago and led by Jeff Tweedy, the group blends alternative rock, country, folk, and experimental sounds into a style that's both timeless and forward-thinking. Over the course of their acclaimed career, Wilco has released a string of landmark albums including Yankee Hotel Foxtrot, A Ghost Is Born, and Sky Blue Sky, earning multiple Grammy Awards and a devoted global following.

Known for their rich songwriting, adventurous musicianship, and unforgettable live performances, Wilco continues to evolve with each release. Their latest work reflects the band's enduring spirit of exploration while staying rooted in the melodic craftsmanship that has defined them for nearly three decades.

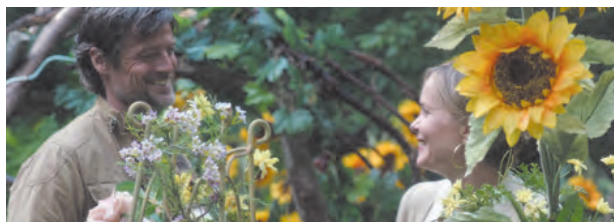
Mississippi Filmmaker Debuts “The Gardener”

The View Beyond The Balcony: To the Moon and Back

I remember how as a young boy I used to lie in the St. Augustine grass in my front yard at night, gazing at the moon and stars through my father's military binoculars. I wondered at all the things out there just waiting to be discovered. I imagined aliens on other planets and pondered if they were looking back at me with the same curiosity. Those were some of my first existential experiences which, upon reflection, were telling me that, while there was much to be explored "out there," there was much to be explored inside.

On April 1 we witnessed the launch of Artemis II, one of, if not the greatest manned space flights in the history of Earth. Astronauts Victor Glover, Jeremy Hansen, Christina Koch, and Reid Wiseman made history for many things, not the least of which was traveling deeper into space than any human ever had.

It had been fifty-four years since Apollo 17 took seventy-five lunar orbits, ending the mission of the Apollo rocket program. That program had brought us innumerable discoveries and crossed incalculable hurdles, the most notable of which was the Apollo 11 Moon landing in 1969. Prior to that, Mercury and Gemini rockets had flown major milestones in NASA's space program. Every step along the way prepared for the next, with the ultimate goal of building a permanent habitat suitable for humans on the Moon. Even that will be a tactical maneuver in readiness for further space exploration.

From the beginning of the space race my parents, siblings, and I would gather around our black-and-white TV to watch the launches and splash downs of every flight we could. The news icon, Walter Cronkite, a man most Americans trusted so much they called him "Uncle Walter," reported these stellar events live on CBS.

I'm old enough (barely) to remember Alan Shepard emerging from Freedom 7, a part of the Mercury-Redstone 3 mission, who took a suborbital flight, becoming the first American to reach space. I remember when, in 1962, John Glenn stepped out of Friendship 7, a part of the Mercury-Atlas 6 mis-

sion, after having become the first American to orbit Earth. And, of course, I remember when Apollo 11 landed men on the Moon and walked its surface in 1969. In fact, I still have a copy of the *Look* magazine with the moon landing on the cover and the edition of Mississippi's Clarion Ledger with the banner headline "Man Walks on the Moon." (By then we had a color TV but the event was broadcast in black-and-white.)

We gave particular attention to the Apollo rockets because my uncle, Lewis LaRon Gober, was an engineer on the team that developed the timing system for the rockets. It used a tuning fork mechanism that was later replicated and commercialized in the Accutron watches because . . . well, because it was so darned accurate.

People sometimes complain about how much the space program costs. They forget all the by-products that came through the space program like Dustbusters, camera phone sensors, water purification systems, Velcro, Teflon, Memory foam, scratch-resist lenses for glasses, grooved pavement, freeze-dried food, athletic shoes with space boot technology, advanced heart pumps, components for heart bypass surgery, CAT scans, solar cells, cloud-based computer platforms (OpenStack), LEDs, powered lubricants, food space food products partnered with Pillsbury (Another uncle of mine, Paul J. Kelsey, was an Executive VP with Pillsbury during that time.), jaws of life, adjustable smoke detectors, baby formula, artificial limbs, powerful telescopes, computer mouses (mousi or meeces?), portable computers, and cochlear implants—these—all these things and much, much more plus all their spin-offs.

Beyond all that are the intangibles space travel has inspired. The entire genre of fantasy and science fiction literature is largely based on our dreams of outer space. There's a plethora of television programs, music, and movies that were spawned from the dreams of outer space. Those dreams have brought us this far. They will take us farther still into this ever-expanding universe of which we are merely a speck.



Just look at what all our imaginings have yielded! What dreams may come? I can only imagine.

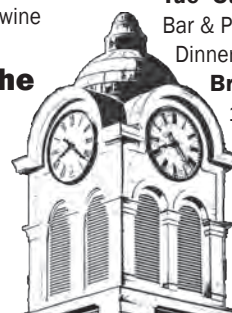

Early art experience: As a kid, I was always in some kind of art class. But honestly, I was slow to catch onto the lessons, and I rarely won anything. I did finally win something in highschool with a piece that went into my college portfolio, and that aligned with the time I started taking art more seriously.

If you're a student considering art school now, it's a totally different game. There's so many free or very affordable resources now that I didn't have back then, and I'm so jealous of you guys. These days, I "take" a lot of courses on Skillshare and Domestika, as well as back

other artists on Patreon, so I can learn from them. Never stop learning!

Favorite book or author:

Bunny by Mona Awad, The Artist's Way by Julia Cameron, Tales of the City by Armistead Maupin, Just Kids by Patti Smith.

Favorite quote: I'm sure I'll think of a good one two days from now. I have a lot of favorite swear words, do those count?



Do you work out of a studio? Nooo.. not anymore, no. I was a gallery artist for several years and that sh*t's expensive. I still have most of my old supplies and easels around the house, but these days I do everything on the iPad Pro, or in my sketchbook.

How many hours do you spend in your studio each day? One to two hours per day, unless working on a project. I have a Goodnotes tracker I keep to make sure I do a little every day of the month (trying to compete with myself from month-to-month), but the rule is: even a half-hour is a win - it's still moving forward.

Most productive hours? Any time after my noontime coffee, but for art, it's often after dinner.

Favorite project you've completed: For the past three years, I've committed to doing Inktober (an annual art challenge that takes place throughout October), and I LOVE it. It's so helpful for pushing you to think fast, beyond your comfort zone. I look forward to it every year now.

Three ideas you want to explore in art: Right now, it's more like "what do you want to do more of?". I really want to do more life drawing, more storytelling pattern design, and more illustration for articles. But I'm spreading those goals out across this year - so not everything all at once!

Do you have a "day job"? If so, where? My husband and I own a store and deli in Taylor, MS called Offbeat in General. I'm there five-six days a week cashiering and making sandwiches, and I also do remote graphic design work for a logistics company in Memphis. I'm not going to lie, my jobs can be overwhelming in the Spring and Fall, but having my life laid out has let me do art at my own pace without financial pressure... which I wasn't able to do before.

Favorite music/bands: Mostly jazz: John Coltrane, Herbie Hancock, and of course, Miles Davis. But I like 90's rap too.

What are some of your other hobbies? When I have extra time, I like to play indie games on my Steam Deck. Currently, I'm playing Crime Scene Cleaner and Graveyard Keeper.

Where do you hang out in Oxford? For nights out, I'm all about City Grocery Bar, Boure, or The Blind Pig.

Aspirations: I have a few "middle-aged" aspirations like "have a retirement fund", or "finally landscape the front of our building", but for art, I try not to push big goals onto myself. It was toxic for me in the past. As long as I focus on doing a little every day and I keep learning, I'll stumble onto cool projects (like this!). 📺

The annual iHeart Podcast Awards were held at SXSW in Austin, Texas, back in March. If you're searching for some new addictions to add to your queue, you won't go wrong with any of these recipients:

"Giggy Squad" — These former Bravo gals from "Summer House" have hit the big time with their hugely popular podcast, even selling out Radio City Music Hall twice for their live tour in 2025. Hosts Hannah Berner and Paige DeSorbo have also caught the attention of Amy Poehler, who is producing a comedy series for them on Netflix. Big Flavor, Small Budget: Coconut Dal with a Clever Twist

International dishes have a way of sounding more complicated than they really are. Long ingredients lists, unfamiliar ingredients and the idea that you’ll need a special trip across town just to get started can make a simple, nourishing meal feel out of reach.

But here’s the truth: Some of the most comforting, flavorful dishes in the world are built from common, humble ingredients.

This Golden Coconut Dal is exactly that kind of meal. It’s warm, creamy and deeply satisfying, made with everyday ingredients you can find just about anywhere: onion, garlic, ginger, a can of coconut milk and a handful of fresh vegetables. No specialty store required.

The “clever twist” comes from an unexpected addition: apple. It melts into the lentils as they cook, adding a subtle sweetness that balances the warmth of ginger, turmeric and spices without needing to add sugar. It’s the kind of little twist that makes the dish feel just a little more special.

A few handfuls of spinach and bell pepper bring color, texture and extra nutrition, turning this into a true one-pot meal. Finished with a squeeze of lime, a sprinkle of fresh cilantro and a dollop of plain yogurt, the flavors come into perfect balance — bright, creamy and comforting all at once.

Golden Coconut Dal with Apple, Ginger and Lime

- Yield: 4 servings
- Total time: 45 minutes
- 2 tablespoons coconut oil
- 1 tablespoon curry powder
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper (optional)
- 1 medium sweet onion, finely chopped (about 1 cup)
- 1 orange or yellow bell pepper, finely chopped (about 1 cup)
- 2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
- 1 1/2 tablespoons fresh ginger, peeled and grated or minced (or 1 1/2 teaspoons ground ginger)
- 2 teaspoons fresh turmeric, peeled and grated or minced (or 1/2 teaspoon ground turmeric)
- 1 large Granny Smith apple, unpeeled, grated on the large holes of a box grater
- 1 1/2 cups red lentils, rinsed
- 1 (13.5-ounce) can coconut milk
- 3 cups vegetable broth or water
- 2 cups fresh spinach, roughly chopped
- Zest and juice of 1 lime
- Kosher salt, to taste
- Freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- 4 cups cooked white or brown rice
- For serving: plain yogurt, cilantro leaves, lime wedges



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Fresh ginger and turmeric bring warmth, color and depth to this Golden Coconut Dal with apple and lime.

Diva Tip: Have all your ingredients prepped and ready before you begin. This recipe moves quickly once it starts.

Heat coconut oil in a large pot over medium-low heat. Add curry powder, cumin, black pepper and cayenne (if using). Cook, stirring constantly, for about 2 minutes, until fragrant.

Add the onion and cook for 5-7 minutes, stirring occasionally, until softened and just beginning to caramelize. Stir in the bell pepper, garlic, ginger and turmeric, and cook for another 2-3 minutes, until fragrant and slightly softened.

Add the grated apple and lentils, stirring to coat everything in the spices. Pour in the coconut milk and vegetable broth. Increase heat and bring to a gentle boil.

Reduce heat to low, cover and simmer, stirring occasionally, for 20-25 minutes, until the lentils are very tender and the dal is thick and creamy.

Stir in the spinach, lime zest and lime juice. Cook for another 1-2 minutes, until the spinach is wilted. Season with salt and additional black pepper to taste.

Serve warm with rice and top with yogurt, cilantro and a squeeze of fresh lime.

This kind of meal proves a larger point: Good cooking isn’t about more ingredients or more money. It’s about using simple things and letting them shine. Enjoy!

Sheet Pan Pizza Frittata: A Fast, Frugal Dinner That Feels Like a Treat

Is it pizza for breakfast or breakfast for dinner? It’s part frittata, part pizza and all quick weeknight cooking.

This is one of those meals that solves a lot of problems. It’s ready in about 30 minutes and works just as well for brunch or lunch as it does for dinner. It’s naturally gluten-free, lower in carbs and far less expensive than takeout. And if you happen to have leftovers, you’re in luck. A slice tucked into a piece of bread or wrapped up with a handful of greens makes a terrific next-day lunch. It’s even surprisingly good cold or at room temperature — perfect for those moments when you need something quick and relatively healthy.

What I love most about this recipe is how flexible it is. You can use just about any vegetables you have on hand. Mushrooms, onions and bell peppers are a great starting point, but zucchini, spinach or tomatoes work beautifully too. This is where those little bits and pieces in the fridge come together and become dinner.

SHEET PAN PIZZA FRITTATA SUPREME

Yield: 4 to 6 Servings
Total Time: 30 minutes
12 large eggs
1/3 cup half and half, cream or whole milk
1 1/2 teaspoons Italian seasoning, divided

- 1 teaspoon kosher salt, divided
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper, divided
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 8 ounces mushrooms, sliced
- 1/2 cup diced yellow onion
- 1/2 cup diced bell pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 cup pizza sauce (store-bought or recipe below)
- 8 slices pepperoni
- 1 cup (4 ounces) mozzarella cheese, shredded

Preheat the oven to 425 F. Lightly coat a quarter sheet pan (or a 9x13-inch baking dish) with cooking spray.

In a large bowl, whisk together the eggs, cream or milk, 1/2 teaspoon Italian seasoning, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper until well combined. Set aside.

Warm the olive oil in a skillet over medium-high heat. Add the mushrooms, onion and bell pepper along with the remaining Italian seasoning, garlic powder, salt and pepper. Cook, stirring occasionally, until the vegetables are softened and lightly browned, about 5 to 7 minutes.

Spread the cooked vegetables evenly over the prepared pan. Pour the egg mixture over the top and place in the oven. Bake for 9 to 10 minutes, or until the eggs are mostly set.



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This easy sheet pan frittata turns everyday ingredients into a satisfying, pizza-inspired meal.

Remove the pan from the oven and switch the oven to broil. Spoon the pizza sauce over the eggs, then scatter the pepperoni and mozzarella on top. Return to the oven and broil for about 2 minutes, or until the cheese is melted and bubbly and the eggs are fully set.

Serve this with a quick salad and maybe a slice of warm crusty bread, and you’ve got a complete meal that feels a little special without requiring much effort at all.

PETITE PORTION PIZZA SAUCE

Yield: About 3/4 cup
Prep Time: 20 minutes
1 (8-ounce) can tomato sauce
1 teaspoon garlic powder
1 teaspoon Italian seasoning
1 teaspoon sugar

Line a fine-mesh strainer with a coffee filter (a paper towel works in a pinch) and set it over a bowl. Pour in the tomato sauce and let it drain for about 15 minutes, or until noticeably thickened.

Transfer the thickened sauce to a small bowl. Stir in the garlic powder, Italian seasoning and sugar until well combined. Use immediately or cover and refrigerate until ready to use.

A baking pan, a dozen eggs and a few simple odds and ends — that’s all it takes to turn what you have on hand into something perfectly delicious.
