Black History Month Concert at Ole Miss: Angela Brown to Perform

World-renowned soprano **Angela Brown** will be the featured guest artist of the 20th annual Black History Month Concert "If Love Fails, Try Nothing Else" at the University of Mississippi on February 25, 2025.

The Black History Month Concert, begun in 2005 by Dr. George W. K. Dor and the Ole Miss African Drum and Dance Ensemble (OMADDE), has featured a rotation of Music Department ensembles over the years, with OMADDE and Concert Singers, directed by Dr. Don **Trott**, slated to perform this year.

"Over the many years Dr. George Dor has produced the Black History Month Concerts, he has invited me to have several of our choirs participate. It not only allows us to perform repertoire with a focus on celebrating Black com-

posers, it allows our students to be part of a larger celebration with a focus on the importance of Black culture in the arts and our society," said Trott.

Over the past two decades, the Black History Month concert has hosted an array of talented guest artists, including UM Music alumna **Dr. Carline Waugh**, the Fisk Jubilee Singers of Nashville, New Orleans jazz clarinet sensation **Doreen Ketchens**, and Grammy-winning saxophonist Kirk Whalum, who shared the stage with The Mississippians Jazz Ensemble in 2024.

Angela Brown is the featured guest artist at this year's event. Brown is no stranger

to the stage, performing in opera and symphonic settings across six continents. She made her Metropolitan Opera debut in the title role of Aida, sang the award-winning solo for composer Nkeiru Okoye's work *When the Caged Bird Sings*, and is a featured artist on the two-time

Grace, respectively.

"I am very excited to perform a recital with Angela Brown as part of the annual BHM Concert," said Johnston. "In addition to being an accomplished dramatic soprano on the opera stage, she is also committed to showcasing the music of Black composers. Our program promises to be compelling, including works by Richard Danielpour, Nkeiru Okoye, and John Daniel Carter."

Performing compositions or arrangements by Black composers or arrangers, or compositions or arrangements in the vein of Black music genres, is a long-standing tradition for organizers of the Black History Month Concert. Brown's repertoire for the concert includes arranged Spirituals, arias from operas composed by Black composers, and art songs—commissioned and premiered by Brown.

> During Brown's Artist Residency, opera and music students will have the opportunity to take part in a Q&A Session in the choral rehearsal room of the music building on Monday, February 24, from 4 to 5 pm. Students are invited to participate in a masterclass with the singer on Wednesday, February 26, from 1 to 3 pm in Nutt Auditorium.


"What students may gain depends on each individual student," Dor said. "While the audience will experience sublime artistry, some music students may gain inspiration and motivation for their future career

paths. Others will join us to celebrate the contributions of Black musicians to the world's diverse rich music traditions."

For two decades The Black History Month Concert has been bringing audiences together to experience and enjoy Black music. Such a celebration year after year is made possible thanks to the many sponsors across campus, collective planning by the Music Department faculty and staff, Ford Center staff, the university's technical teams, and student participation.

The 2025 Black History Month Concert will be held at the Gertrude C. Ford Center for the Performing Arts on at 7:30 pm. Admission is free, and all are welcome.

- 1. Brooklyn, in the 1965 song by Gene Pitney. Besides creating his own hits, Pitney penned chart toppers for others, including the Crystals, Ricky Nelson, Vikki Carr and Roy Orbison.
- 2. The Troggs, in 1967. The song charted around the globe, but it really took off when Scottish band Wet Wet Wet covered the song for the film and soundtrack "Four Weddings and a Funeral." Their version topped the charts nearly everywhere.
- 3. Smokey Robinson and the Miracles, in 1965. In 2021 it was ranked as "The Greatest Motown Song of All Time.'
- 4. Carly Simon, in 1971.
- 5. "Hurt So Bad," by Little Anthony & The Imperials, in 1964. The song was a hit for the group, especially after they sang it on "The Ed Sullivan Show." The song has been covered by numerous others, including The Lettermen and Linda Ronstadt.







Born in 1937, Nero was a high school football star who played in college and was recruited to play professionally. He remains close with childhood friend Morgan Freeman.

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Speaking Truth to Power

In the Old Testament of the Bible there were more than a few people who were considered to be prophets. Today we mostly consider prophets as people who are able to tell the future. There is a bit of that, but the Hebrew translation of prophet is more akin to this: "Called by God and filled with God's spirit. A prophet spoke God's word to people who had in one way or another distanced themselves from God. In one sense, a prophet is a preacher. But in marketplace terms, a prophet is often a whistle-blower, particularly when an entire tribe or nation has turned away from God." (Theology of Work.org) So a prophet, then, is one who tells forth the truth, especially to poweroften at great risk to themselves.

There's not nearly enough space in this column to contain the entire list of Old Testament prophets and the warnings they gave to the kings of their day. A simple Google search will yield dozens of sites that detail the confrontive messages of prophets to the powers of the day. Even Jesus aggressively called out the religious leaders of the day (Matthew 23:13-39, KJV).

If you truly care about knowing the truth, please look it up.

If you don't know about Bishop Mariann Budde's prophetic words to Donald Trump during a prayer service at Washington's National Cathedral on Tuesday, January 21, you must have been living under a rock. Here's what she said directly to the President:

"Let me make one final plea, Mr. President. Millions have put their trust in you. And as you told the nation yesterday, you have felt the providential hand of a loving God. In the name of our God, I ask you to have mercy upon the people in our country who are scared now.

There are gay, lesbian, and transgender children in Democratic, Republican, and independent families, some who fear for their lives. Our God teaches us that we are to be merciful to the stranger, for we were all once strangers in this land."




- On **Feb. 17, 1998**, the United States defeated Canada by 3-1 to take home the gold medal in the first women's hockey tournament held at the Winter Olympics, in Nagano, Japan.
- On Feb. 18, 2003, Kim Daehan ignited a gasoline-filled container inside a subway train in Daegu, South Korea. The resulting blaze engulfed the six-car train and spread to another that pulled into the station minutes later, killing 198 people and injuring nearly 150 more. Daehan later confessed to police that he'd wanted to commit suicide and chose a crowded place to do so because he didn't wish to die alone.
- On **Feb. 19, 1777**, the Continental Congress voted to promote Thomas Mifflin; Arthur St. Clair; William Alexander, Lord Stirling; Adam Stephen; and Benjamin Lincoln to the rank of major general, leaving Brigadier General Benedict Arnold feeling slighted that five junior officers received advancement ahead of him and, in response, threatening to resign from the Patriot army.
- On **Feb. 20, 1939**, New York City's Madison Square Garden hosted a rally celebrating the rise of Nazism in Germany. Inside, more than 20,000 attendees raised Nazi salutes toward a 30-foot-tall portrait of George Washington flanked by swastikas, while police and some 100,000 protesters gathered outside.
- On Feb. 21, 1862, at the Battle of Valverde, Confederate troops attacked Union troops near Fort Craig in New Mexico Territory in the first major engagement of the Civil War in the far West. The fighting yielded heavy casualties but no decisive result.
- On **Feb. 22, 2006**, a gang of at least six men, some armed, made off with 53 million pounds from the Securitas bank depot in Kent, Great Britain the largest such theft in British history.
- On **Feb. 23, 2020**, Ahmaud Arbery, a 25-year-old Black man, was shot to death by a white father and son while jogging in Georgia. William Bryan, who filmed the shooting on his phone, was arrested and charged with felony murder and criminal attempt to commit false imprisonment, while Gregory and Travis McMichael were arrested on charges of murder and aggravated assault, after Bryan's video of the killing was released.




