

Alabama Shakes' Oxford Prologue

Friday, March 29 at Proud Larry's


"Over-night sensation" is tossed around quite a bit when talking about the latest buzz band, especially with the advent of YouTube and do-it-yourself blogs. **Alabama Shakes** hasn't been immune to the viral treatment, but unlike many of the other buzz bands out there, they have a spot to claim in 2012's music playground and the staying power to prove they are more than the cliché "over-night sensation."

Hailing from Athens, Alabama, a town outside of Huntsville with a population roughly on par with Oxford's, Alabama Shakes has blown up since their "discovery" in a Nashville record store only just a year ago. The infancy of the group began when lead singer **Brittany Howard** approached **Zac Cockrell** in a high school psych class and extended an invitation to jam. They brought in **Steve**

Johnson, a drummer Brittany knew from the local music store and began performing at parties as a cover band, emulating **Led Zeppelin** and **Otis Redding**. By this point, they had begun developing their own sound, a mash of their unique interests. They found commonality and soon after, they laid some tracks down with guitarist **Heath Fogg**.

All things considered, the band began to gain some notoriety, and soon after their Nashville unearthing, they found themselves opening up for the **Drive-By Truckers**. (DBT was "blown away", as the story goes.) Nowadays, having appeared on late night television and accepted the invitation to the pinnacle of all music festivals, SXSW, they've become the act to book for the 2012 circuit, and before they sail onward across the Atlantic and onto Europe, they'll be stopping by North Mississippi for a visit—all before their debut drops in April.

Alabama Shakes is a possessed disposition of a soul, jazz, and rock 'n' roll band; an endeavor that hasn't gone untried, but blasting from *this* quartet, it's **fresh** refreshing—refreshing in the way a mimosa is on a Saturday afternoon. What separates this band from the rest of the Otis Redding covers out there is what makes a mimosa not just a stan-



dard cup of maimed oranges. It has an edge that flushes down the thickness with a perfect measure of sophistication. The mix is the bustling persona of Brittany Howard. Howard unifies her bi-part nucleus of rock and soul with hints of a schizophrenic-like forwardness that is both curious and tribulating. Her stage presence is intoxicating and her story telling inescapable. They are the tender stories swept under the rug never to wound again, but always still delicately there. They are the narration to the human condition. Oh, and she can play a mean guitar.

The rest of the band is an amplification of Howard's roots-rocking, soul-shaking persona. The rhythm section delivers an idiom of two flavors. When melodically snaking their path through a tune, they egg on the temperate movement of a swaying neck and relaxed eyes, meandering down a river soaking up the sun's warm sensations. True to everything else about this band, they can rock it, laying on thick distortion and flipping that R&B motif that runs wild everywhere else into an earnest classic rock exploration, served with the mean vocals of Howard. Most importantly, when the rock personality is in charge, the cymbal crashing dexterity of Johnson's pulse is perhaps the most impressive, heralding in a rock metal niche that thumps out rhythms that make the rock 'n' roll grooves a cut above this recent crop of buzz bands.

While mulling over the accolades and the prospects of seeing them, (Thursday, March 29 at **Proud Larry's**), YouTube their performance "Hold On" Live from the Shoals (which has generated nearly half a million views in roughly six months). Or, Google any respectable college radio station (KEXP for instance), and peruse their video channel and you will see--and hear--what the buzz is about. Alabama Shakes amasses a great deal of zest that layers together like a cake, but the heart of it all is the soul that possesses each of the individuals that make up this ensemble. They have an intuitive bond that feeds their music, an important mark that makes the good bands great. From here, they hug the roots and reasons behind their writing, making the emotion seamless and the delivery exciting, like a well-mixed mimosa on a Saturday afternoon.





Indie Horror Film to Shoot in Oxford



Early music experience: Keith Sanders (KS) -


My dad is a musician, so I started pretty early. I started playing trumpet at the age of seven and it all kind of snowballed from there. I hooked up with Shane about four years ago. We started playing, and the rest is history. **Shane King (SK) -** I started playing the drums in the 9th grade for my buddy's blues band. I learned how to play guitar from their lead singer, Matthew Banks. After high school, I started playing seriously, sometime around 2007. I met up with Keith in Morehead and we've been playing together ever since.

You both shuffle back and forth with vocals. Who's the stronger singer? SK - Keith. I have a good voice; I just tear it up, trying to get it out. KS - Recently, I started working with Shane on vocals. He has a totally different sound. That way, we have more of a variety of music. When he sings a song, I tell him to focus on hitting every note. I make sure his pitch is on top, and after that, he finds his own sound.

Meeting up in Cleveland, Mississippi, how did your duo make its way to Oxford? KS - Shane and I have been friends for, shoot. I don't know how many years. One day, we decided we didn't want to get stuck in Cleveland. My brother lived here too. It took us all of an hour to decide we were moving to Oxford. SK - We got tired of the Delta. My brother, Scott, and good friend, David Lewis, both lived here, as well as some more delta hooligans.

There's a good crowd that follows Dry Rub downstairs to the basement of the Rib Cage. How'd you start playing there? KS - Well, we both work at the Rib Cage. Buck wasn't looking for entertainment really, but we told him we'd play. Customers started telling him they liked us and that we were a "good time band." They were mostly our friends. Then, he kept hiring us.

What contemporary bands would you compare Dry Rub to for those who've never seen your show? Slightly Stoopid meets Mofro with a little bit of John Prine and Bill Withers.



During your shows, you play a couple of covers. What's your favorite crowd pleaser? KS - We don't just play covers, but when we do, we play them our way. SK - I like to play cover songs that you wouldn't normally hear at a bar. We do not play "Mustang Sally" or "Brown Eyed Girl." You've got the wrong band. I like to cover Corey Brennan. The cover songs just help bring the crowd in, and then we always throw in some originals.

What's been your favorite and least favorite gig in Oxford? KS - I played at Parrish's one night. Two guys got in a fight. One of them told the other, "If you've got one ounce of Aryan blood in your body, you'll meet me outside." It was funny. My least favorite was one night at Irie. I was playing with a 102 degree fever, and then later found out, I had been playing all night with a ruptured appendix. SK - My favorite was at the Rib Cage shrimp boil. Adrian Dickey played with us. We played all night, probably close to seven hours. And least favorite, downstairs of the Cage, hammered. I couldn't remember the words or get my hands to do what my mind was thinking.

Ya'll are scheduled to play at Irie on Wednesday nights. How'd you get from the Cage to there? KS - I was out with friends singing karaoke. The owner heard I also played guitar. He gave us one Wednesday to show him what we were worth. We drew a solid crowd and had a lot of fun. So, he kept booking us for Wednesdays.

What's your favorite encore song? KS - One night we wrote a rendition telling people not to go home, but to get the hell out of here. It's nothing like the original. SK - I like playing "The War" by Lucero. **TV**



Whenever I enter a record store, the first thing I do is check out the Frank Zappa selection. I do it for two reasons: (1. I love Frank Zappa, and (2. it serves as something of a litmus test for the store. If they have a good Frank Zappa selection, then I know they're the real deal and I'm not wasting my time. Last week I visited Oxford's new record store, **The End of All Music**. Is it the real deal? Well, I walked away with my favorite Zappa album, *One Size Fits All*. You do the math.

As for the music itself, it hit me at a time when I was in desperate need of something different, something *really* different. I had spent all of high school flooding my ear canals with the same eleven songs my local classic rock radio station played on rotation, day-in and day-out. Then came *One Size Fits All*. It's an exhibition of everything that made Zappa great: off-the-wall musical arrangements, surrealist humor, and, yes, a devastating guitar solo here and there.

Now, is it his finest offering? God, I don't know. The man released oodles of material in his lifetime, and though I've been an ardent fan for the past five years, I feel I've only scratched the hairy surface of the Frank Zappa iceberg. But it certainly spoke to 18-year-old me. One minute into "Inca Roads," the first song on the album, and you realize this is the music he wanted to hear, not what a cigar-puffing record executive wanted. There's an undeniable passion and conviction to Frank Zappa's music. He genuinely believed in his work, in spite of the shrugged shoulders, raised eyebrows, and looks of "I don't know..." it caused over the years. Forget Robert Frost, man, *that's* the inspiration you need leaving high school. And hey, it doesn't hurt that it's set against the backdrop of great, great music. **TV**

Eggs on a Blanket

-Serves two with an appetite-

- Olive oil
- A few strips of bacon, chopped (optional)
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2-3 cloves of garlic, chopped
- Carrots, chopped
- 1/2 cup dried tomatoes
- 1 REAL BIG bunch of greens (swiss chard or kale), chopped coarsely
- 4 eggs

Saute bacon, onion, and garlic in olive oil. Add carrots and tomatoes (or any other vegetable you have on hand) and saute a few minutes. Add chard, cover pan for a few minutes. Uncover, stir well, and use the back of the spoon to make 4 depressions in the cooked leaves. Break an egg into each depression. Cover and allow eggs to poach 3-5 minutes. Remove from heat. Can stand alone or be served over brown rice or whole wheat noodles.

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John Sinclair is one of my heroes. In my early twenties I regarded myself a revolutionary of sorts, a hippie with an edge who wanted to take over the current government and start over with a more communal, caring, and carefree lifestyle. In the ensuing years, I have done a lot of research and (hopefully) become a little more adult. I've done a lot of reading on what I've taken to calling "Hippie History": books on The Beats, Ken Kesey, Timothy Leary's sect, and more acid-dropping historical figures. I've learned a lot from my reading—namely, that I was not meant to lead a revolution.

I do, however, admire those who have tried to make something sensible of this country, those who have actually done things that are stuck in people's minds sixty years later. The counter-cultural revolution John Sinclair began in the 60s was born out of desire for cultural freedom—sex, drugs, and rock 'n' roll, basically. But more than that, **The White Panther Party** was about busting out of the social norms to exploit the reality of the sociopolitical state of Amerika in the 60s.

Like all recent Amerikan revolutions, the movement was squelched. In the 'Preview' of *Guitar Army*, John basically sums up its downfall: *"We lost sight of the larger view... and got caught up to a great extent in the immediacy of our insane demands, we thought the apocalypse was going to come any minute and instead of working with our people to build up an alternative social order which would be the long-range solution, we concentrated on exhorting kids to join us in "making the revolution in the belly of the beast," which was much too abstract and much too frightening for them to relate to in any way."*

There's no segue from the movement that you were a part of in the 60s and 70s because I don't know a whole lot about what you've done since then. Gotta keep it a secret cause it's mostly in the arts. They don't really discuss the arts anymore unless it's a movie or a television show. I read the *New York Times* arts section every day to get to the crossword puzzle... I'm a poet, a performer, a bandleader, and I've got my own radio station, on the interweb (laughs).

When did you start that? This is its eighth year, Radio Free Amsterdam. We started with one show of

the John Sinclair Radio Show, and I just ran my 431st episode on Monday. Comes out every Monday, my show. And then I built it into an embryonic online radio station. radiofreeamsterdam.com

And it's all you, or do you have people helping? Well, I do it all myself but I have other people's stuff. I've got Scott Barretta every week—Highway 61 out of Oxford, Mississippi. I've got my friend Harry Duncan of San Francisco in the Soul Kitchen, I've got John Morgan from WWOZ doing the New Orleans music show, Leslie Keros of Chicago, my first female DJ, I just added her last month... so, friends of mine who've done like me—making radio shows for obscure public stations, or syndicated like Scott and Cary

Wilson. We've been doing it for years, you know, once a week. So I'm kind of enshrining these things. So I hear something good that I like, I say, "Send me some shows and I'll put them on RadioFreeAmsterdam." But then they're out there. You can listen to them anytime; it's not like radio, they don't disappear. I have a stream; you can play shows from my archives, or listen to new shows. Sometimes I'll post two or three shows a day. So, this is how I have my fun. In the future they'll exist, and maybe someday people will discover they need this music. Unlike today—they don't need it. They need it but they don't feel that they need it. They think they can get along in this world with the stuff they've got today. I do a jazz show once a week, it's called "Jazz From the Hemp Shop."

So, how long have you been in Amsterdam? Since 2003. I'm just based there, you know, I'm not even a resident. I'm just there two or three months out of the year, whenever I can get away with it. Three months is really the legal limit. I don't have any work there, so I have to go other places to live.


Yeah, I thought fleetingly about squatting in Amsterdam at one time. Squatting has been made illegal now, since last October. They've got a religious right-wing government. The leading force from the government right now is the anti-Islam party. They just made the burqa illegal, even though there are only maybe 50 women in Holland who wear 'em... It's all nuts, it's like these idiots here. They just haven't gone that far yet.

Well, they have gone that far. They've just not made that particular law yet. They're working on it, the anti-Sharia movement. It's all a bunch of gods. I never in my life thought I'd end up in the 21st century in the middle of a religious crusade against the infidels... in a country owned by rich people.

Jimmy Reidy Benefit Concert Set for 4/12


Jimmy Reidy is from Oxford, and his Dad has been a teacher at OHS for 20 years. Jimmy has worked at **Volta Taverna** for about a year, where he is considered part of their family. He is always polite, positive, and happy go lucky. The Saturday morning before spring break, he was play wrestling with his friend and landed wrong. He broke his neck in two spots, and three of his vertebrae got knocked out of alignment. After being picked up by the ambulance, he was airlifted to the Medical Regional Hospital in Memphis where he remained in ICU for seven days. He can only move his left leg, and recently has obtained minimal movement in his left arm. He does not have any motion in the rest of his body. He had surgery on Monday, May 19, and his family said he is in a lot of pain right now. Once he is released from the hospital, he'll be going into a rehab program to try and regain movement in the rest of his body. We are trying to raise as much money as we can to help him pay for his hospital bills and for his rehab program. 



I'd rather give my money directly to Ron Shapiro, with a smile, to keep those Velvet Elvises rocking and rolling than to the invisible execs with their mansions in distant vistas who never return my smile. I don't mind the corporate clime, so long as we leave the local line. No Dad, Oxford hasn't changed much since I've been gone, but I do miss that Main Squeeze.

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

And with genres ranging from Blues to Metal, Jazz to "Soda Pop," there's a little bit of everything for everyone to enjoy.



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Ole Miss Theatre presents *An Evening with Christopher Durang*, two one-act plays directed by Adam Brooks and Melissa McFeeters, Ole Miss Theatre students in the BA program. The two featured plays, *The Actor's Nightmare*, directed by junior Brooks, and *'dentity Crisis*, directed by senior McFeeters, are performing on Tuesday, March 27 through Sunday, April 1 at 7:30 pm, with matinees on Saturday, March 31 and Sunday, April 1 at 2 pm. All performances are in Meek Auditorium.

These two one-acts showcase typical Durang quandaries: *The Actor's Nightmare* follows the plight of George, an unknowing stranger who is thrown onto a stage and is supposed to know the lines and plot to a play for which he is ill-prepared; *'dentity Crisis* is a witty view into Jane's recovery from a nervous breakdown, but the audience will soon discover that recovery may be an insurmountable task as all those around Jane are having identity crises of their own.

Christopher Durang is an American playwright well-known for his absurd sense of humor. Adam Brooks, who hails from Union, Mississippi, as director of *The Actor's Nightmare* appreciates Durang's process, "He's not really subtle with the issues he often addresses in his works, but he approaches them in comically appropriate spoonfuls." Durang's zany take on things present a unique opportunity for Ole Miss students, placing them inside the mind of a brilliant, active writer.

"I think this play is absolutely hysterical," Brooks said. "It comically touches on the worries that performers have while on stage as George's situation spirals out of control. The characters and their contrasting elements are themselves engines for the accelerating confusion that fascinates me to no end, and the actors keep me laughing through every rehearsal."

McFeeters, a Fort Worth, Texas, native, said of her experience with Durang's work, "'dentity Crisis is an absurdly funny and fast-paced show that has been such a fun play to direct. My cast is always willing to think outside of the box and try new things with their characters when I ask them to try something a little 'out there.'"

And 'out there' is indeed one way to describe Durang's satirical situations—George, a character who knows none of the characters he is meant to portray, and Jane, a delicate woman surrounded by fragmented and dissociated people, who throughout the play become other people.

It's not just the directors who are getting their fair dose of Durang. **Lydia Reed**, costume designer for *'dentity Crisis*, enjoyed the piece so much, she has read several other plays written by Durang. She says, "This was the first play by Christopher Durang that I had read and because I liked it so much, I went and read several other works of his." This exposure often leads to students choosing to seek a richer and more complex experience from the material they work with. We think the audience will feel the same way.

Wake-up Call Comes Early for Diamond Rebs

UNIVERSITY, Miss. (TLV) – A two out rally gave **Auburn** a victory and series win over the Rebels on opening SEC weekend in Oxford, paving the way for a test of resiliency early in the season. Early Monday, Assistant Coach Cliff Goodwin tweeted: "New Day, New Week—Tough Times don't last, but tough people and tough teams do! The REBS are tough!"

Although the result of the series loss to Auburn, one of the SEC's weaker baseball teams (if there is such a thing) in 2012 was not the expectation of those in attendance, the attitude of the coaching staff and team seem to be stronger now than ever. #wintheday.

A wake-up call of the sort can be the best thing to happen to great programs. Ole Miss got one early. How well they respond should tell us just how serious this year's squad is about winning.

Unfortunately, the winning attitude was absolutely missing against **Southern Mississippi** Tuesday, March 20, as the Rebels were whipped by the Golden Eagles, 10-0. In fact, maybe the wake up call extended itself into Tuesday night. These Rebels looked nothing like the team we saw beat #22 Louisville 18-8 March 14.

A trip to **Alabama** this weekend will produce the first road test of the season. The Crimson Tide, or Elephants (see, other schools have mascots that have nothing to do with their nickname), came out flat during their opening SEC weekend and were swept by **Arkansas**. In fact, the Tide has the 11th best overall record in the SEC at 8-12.

If Ole Miss is going to get a road sweep this year, Alabama seems to be the place for it to happen. On the other hand, this could be one of those times we hear a message board junkie use the phrase "That's Baseball" for the 1 millionth time.



After Alabama, the Rebels return home for a four game home stand. A midweek game against powerhouse **Jackson State** sets up for the ultimate showdown against the number one ranked **Florida Gators**.

The Gators, 20-1, will give Ole Miss its toughest assignment of the year. Florida has dominated its competition, losing only once to **Cal State Fullerton** back in mid February.

The bright spot for the Rebels has been the power behind the bats. Ole Miss has belted 17 homeruns on the season so far with outfielder **Zach Kirksey** leading the way with eight dingers. Kirksey, who was limited to playing time in 2011, has been the breakout weapon on the offensive side of the ball in 2012.

The Senior is tied with Florida's **Preston Tucker** for the most homers in the SEC. However, Florida has four players in the top 10 in that category and has belted a whopping 31 homeruns through 20 games.

Kirksey is not the only Rebel making the headlines. Junior **Alex Yarbrough** is currently fourth in the league in RBI (25); third in runs scored (22); third in batting average (.410) and eighth in slugging percentage (.477).

On the mound, **Bobby Wahl** is fifth in the SEC in strikeouts with 34; fourth in ERA (1.55) and third in wins (4). Closer **Brett Huber** stands at third in the SEC for saves with five.



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



Justify Your Existence

We are tired of a basketball team that only interests us enough to compel us to check Twitter during the games.

I remember well the day **Andy Kennedy** was introduced in a **Tad Smith** press conference complete with the familiar **Ole Miss** presented by BancorpSouth backdrop, roll-away stage, and just a handful too many decorative ferns (probably fake ones, and probably the same fake ones we've used to introduce **Kennedy, Orgeron, Nutt, Freeze, Black Bear, Dan Jones, et. al.**). I remember that Ole Miss was the back-up plan for Kennedy after **Cincinnati** had gone with another guy, probably because the Bearcats had gotten close-but-no-cigar to the NCAA Tournament in Kennedy's one season as interim head coach (and that's called "foreshadowing," remedial English students). I remember a mouthy old-guard fan, who leaned in real close to tell me what a blessing it was that Ole Miss finally had "a white one," but I'm sure she was talking about something else because I've seen her explain, since then, on various Facebook pages that she's "not racist, but..."



The thing I remember, though, that is relevant symbolically today, though, is the sight of Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy—the latter of whom stares flat-footed into the former's bellybutton. They really are an interesting pair to look at because of that height difference. And doesn't that picture remind us all of Andy Kennedy's tenure, thus far, at Ole Miss? The peaks and valleys, standing next to, nay, seemingly permanently bound to each other?

Most people will read this column while Kennedy's former team is still competing in the NCAA Tournament. That event is happening contemporaneously with the ongoing consideration by semi-retired athletic director **Pete Boone**, associate A.D. **John Hartwell**, and Chancellor Jones about whether or not Andy Kennedy's contract should be extended after five trips to the NIT—which stands for both the "National Invitation Tournament" and "Not In the Tournament"—in six years, the latest of which ended in a first-round home loss to the Obscure Directional Midwestern State University's Nondescript Fighting Birds squad. Ole Miss fans who find sick and cynical humor in

the athletics program's ability to trip over its own man-parts, metaphorically slight though those may be, are choking up self-deprecating obscenities at this reality. I am increasingly that type of fan.

My tone seems harsh. Allow me to offer some platitudes as to not so blatantly bear my bias, as well as perhaps display a measure of reason in this column.

Relative to his predecessor, Andy Kennedy has done a good job at Ole Miss. He has more than surpassed the last three years of **Rod Barnes**'s tenure in even his worst season. He has won twenty games



five times. He has shared SEC West Championships. And he has put a team that plays in one of the worst facilities in the country in the NCAA tournament conversation consistently. But he gets paid \$1.3 million a year, which is more than 42 coaches who took their teams to the NCAA Tournament in 2011. And he is under contract for three more years, so why exactly, are we talking about letting a lame-duck Athletics Director extend that contract?

We have been down this road before, albeit in a different sport, and we were burned and embarrassed like the Comedy Central Roast of **Charlie Sheen**. Maybe the real-world perspective where good-but-not-close-enough never earns you the contract extension is simplistic; it does not take into account effects of recruiting and athletic contract hamstrings set down by legislative fiat. But it's absurd that Ole Miss is actually thinking about re-negotiating this man's deal when it is on the eve of hiring his new boss. *(editor's note: Ole Miss announced Wednesday, March 21 that Western Kentucky University Athletic Director Ross Bjork will become the AD at Ole Miss sometime after mid-April.)*

We *bloggeurs* want Andy Kennedy to succeed. And we damn sure want him to take Ole Miss to the show in 2013. We are tired of a basketball team that only interests us enough to compel us to check Twitter during the games. We are tired at looking at a "must win" type of situation for this program and immediately assuming a loss.

And given Kennedy's good work thus far we are hopeful that he will deliver. But contract extensions for this type of work are for back-room deals among the good ole boys at multi-million dollar corporations where accountability is less than an afterthought. So, I'm sure Andy Kennedy's contract will be extended.

But, please, Ole Miss, at least think about making our basketball program justify its existence before your do it.

Sit a moment with Dangermuffin's latest album, *Moonscapes*, and you'll hear tales of rogue lawmen, forlorn lovers, and rolling waves. Based in Folly Beach, SC, the eclectic trio casts a fresh perspective on American roots music.

With the release of *Moonscapes* in 2010, Dangermuffin has exploded onto the national scene. They are embarking on coast-to-coast touring courtesy of booking agency **New Frontier** (The Avett Brothers, Darrell Scott) and distribution and promotion support from label **Dualtone Music Group** (Guy Clark, Brett Dennen). Their fan base grows exponentially with each new market and show, as evidenced by their skyrocketing ticket sales nationwide.

Poor Economy Threatens Developer's Ability to Ruin Oxford's Small-town Vibe

OXFORD, MISS. (TLV) — Citing recent government reports that show the nation's housing market is far from recovering, **Stan Mabry**, 34, says he may be forced to choose a different career path. The Brentwood, Tennessee, native has spent the last nine years trying to saturate the **Oxford** real estate market with hastily-built condominiums in areas that were once home to wildlife and nature trails. Despite his best efforts, the town may stay its current size and retain its appeal unless something miraculous happens within the next couple of months.

"It's really hard out here for an overzealous real estate developer when you consider the national trends. Nobody's spending outrageous prices for plots of land where historical houses once sat," the bleached blond SMU alum said. "It's really a shame."

Figures show that while prices remain high in **Lafayette County**, only a handful of new homes were sold in 2011. Many analysts predict only a few percentage points will separate this year's numbers from the last. Mabry believes it could potentially be the downfall for other schmucks like him.

"I arrived here 10 years ago without knowing

anything about the history surrounding this town or its university. I didn't know about The Grove or **William Faulkner**," he said while fidgeting with his Rolex watch, "and I still don't. Those concepts are foreign to me, but I know a good deal when I see one, and boy did I see one."

Mabry quickly seized on the opportunity to construct condominiums wherever a bulldozer could reach. He was thoroughly disappointed when city officials refused to let him renovate **Rowan Oak** into a bed and breakfast.

"I thought these guys could be bought. What happened to the American way? I think I know. It starts with Bah and ends with rock Obama."

Instead, Mabry focused on convincing struggling landowners in less fortunate parts of the city to sell their land at what was considered fair value. In many cases, Mabry realized 80% returns on investments once he sweet-talked them into giving away property that had been in their families for generations.

"It was like stealing candy from a baby; a dumb southern baby," Mabry boasted, "But now that the market has sunk, I'm stuck living off of the millions I made in the past decade. Poverty sucks."

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

I love The Occupy Wall Street movement. It's coming back big-time. They just kicked off last week, the 17th. They've got a spring and summer offensive plan. They've been meeting and planning all winter. I like it a lot, because for the first time, they've found the right target. And they don't have any leaders, and they aren't making any demands—they just see that it's f**ked up. I like that part of it, cause that's the truth. This society's just f**ked up, it's ruined. These rich people ruined it, so that's a good place to start.

With the richest. I just hope it's not as disorganized as it looks, and that it's bigger than it looks and it gets bigger. It's a war of ideas. You can't win a war that involves physical resistance, because they're way bigger than we are. But we're smarter. Cause they've been doing that a long time. But it's a war of ideas and of culture, and if they stick with that, they might get somewhere, I think.

Inherent in organization is corruption, so maybe a lack of leaders is best. I like it. That's what we used to say, "Leaders suck."

It's been a while since I've read this whole thing [Guitar Army], but I seem to remember you priding yourself at the beginning for a lack of leaders. Yeah, I had to move to the forefront as a means of self-defense, you know? To try to stay out, to get out of prison. We had a pretty democratic organization for the time. And anyone who would do something in the line we were in, they were a leader—male, female, dog, cat, whatever. We didn't want to bind anything; we wanted to open some eyes. Still do, but it's an uphill battle now. Then you had a whole generation of people who arrived a certain point, feeling kinda the same way... then you had hippies, and it was a great thing. It was *so* great that they've erased them from history.

Yeah, like they didn't exist? Cause they don't want anyone ever doing that again. It's like acid, they didn't want anybody doing acid again.

Do you still think that acid came along in history exactly when society needed it the most, when the counter-culture needed it the most? I don't use that term, though. "Hippies" is good enough. "Counter-culture" is what they have now; they buy it over the counter. Buying a Home with an FHA Rehab Loan

If you've hoped to buy a home on a low budget, chances are that everything you've looked at needs work. If you're lucky, it might be as simple as paint in every room. On the other hand, perhaps the house you want was a foreclosure that was trashed by vandals when it sat empty, and the cost of the repair work will take more cash than you'll have available after closing.

There are a number of reasons to take on a home that needs work: location (you want to stay in the kids' school district or be closer to work), you can't afford a perfect house, or you see the potential in the house and know it would serve your family well for many years to come.

That's where a Federal Housing Administration 203(k) rehab loan can come in. This type of loan covers the mortgage as well as repairs that need to be made to single-family homes, with the total cost wrapped up in one neat loan package.

There are two levels to the loan program: 1) if the work that needs to be done is fairly simple (doesn't involve structural repairs) and will cost under \$35,000, or 2) extensive renovation at a cost of at least \$5,000 with no maximum limit.

During the rehab process, FHA inspectors will visit the site multiple times to ensure that the work is up to standards and is following the plan. You'll have six months to get the work completed by a contractor. Funds, held in escrow, will be released in stages as the work is done.

If you're interested in a multi-unit building and plan to live in one of the units, the 203(k) can be used for up to four family units. You can build a new house on an old foundation, or move a house to a new location. The work must include improving "thermal efficiency," such as weather stripping and insulation.

The process for securing a 203(k) loan is complicated, with numerous steps to follow, but the stress can be worth it if it gets you the house you want, with repairs made, at a price you can afford.
